CSAD 662. Implantable Devices and Technology. 2 Units

Term Typically Offered: Summer only

Pre-operative assessment and post-operative management of cochlear implants and other implantable devices. Includes patient counseling for expectations, introduction to surgical procedures, mapping, use of assistive devices, and current developments in research.

Place of Course in Program:

This course is generally taken by students in the summer semester of the second year of the graduate program.

Course Policies/Procedures:

- 1. Attendance: Professional attendance is expected for class meetings. Recording: To facilitate students' learning (practice in note-taking) and out of respect for fellow classmates (to allow all students to feel comfortable actively participating in class discussion), students are not permitted to audio or video record lectures. Examinations will be based on class lectures, class activities, and discussions. Exams may be composed of multiple choice, true/false, matching and/or short answer questions. Make-up exams will be scheduled during dead week. Students who fail to complete one or more of the exams by the last day of the final exam period may receive a "0" on their exam(s) as per instructor discretion.

Au.D. Program Policies

Academic conduct
