Description:

CSAD 630: This methods course's focus is on reporting writing and professional communication in audiology. Students will learn about privacy considerations, electronic medical records, structures of clinical reports, and principles of report writing. Students will gain experience writing mock case reports, which will be critiqued and evaluated by clinical faculty.

Course Requirements/Components:

- 1. Class Attendance: Classroom attendance is necessary for this course. No more than two unexcused absences are allowed. Students are expected to arrive on time as class begins at 1:30pm.
- 2. Students are responsible for all assigned readings, whether discussed in class or not, unless otherwise indicated.
- **3. Class Participation:** Students are required to actively participate in class discussions and are required to have read any assigned material prior to class meetings. Failure to participate in 2 class sessions will automatically drop a student's grade by one letter grade.
- **4. Reports:** Each class session, instructor will serve as a mock patient for students to obtain case history and results. Then, students will utilize all the information given to write a professional report which will be printed and turned in at the following class session for credit.
 - The report should contain minimal errors. Please proofread your reports prior to submission. Instructor will edit the reports and they will be returned to student the following class session.
 - Reports are due at the beginning of each class within 5-minutes. Failure to submit 2 reports within 5-minutus of class will automatically drop your grade by one letter grade.
 - Extra points will be given if student can correctly identify mock patient's pathology.

- **5. Presentations:** Each student will be required to make 2 case presentations based upon a unique/interesting client seen in clinic and a pathology given by the instructor. Be sure to obtain a release of information form and be careful to redact identifying information.
 - 1. Clinic Case Presentation: Report case hx, results, recommendations, and report (turned into instructor). Explain why was this patient was interesting/unique and any challenges that came across while testing the patient. Student is also responsible for making the class participate. Time limit: 5-10-mins.
 - 2. Pathology Presentation: Each student will be given a pathology to present on. Student must present the following regarding their pathology background info, etiology, epidemiology, risk factors, clinical manifestations, clinical identification and diagnosis, management (medical and audiology), outcomes, case study, and references (6-8). Student must also write a report based on the case study presented in class to the instructor. Time limit: 10-15-mins.

6. Labs: 3

- 1. Audio with classmate. Have classmate plug one of their ears with an insert prior to evaluation. Write down the time it took to complete audio evaluation. 10 points
- **2.** Audio with a second year classmate. Have classmate plug both of their ears with inserts prior to evaluation. Write down the time it took to complete evaluation. Ask classmate for their feedback parts of the evaluation that went well, parts that needs improvement, and what can you do to improve those areas/skills. Perform an EMI on a second year classmate. 20 points
- **3.** Hearing aid orientation with a second year classmate. Write out a script for HA orientation prior to lab. Ask classmate for feedback parts of the orientation that went well, parts that need improvement, and what can you do to improve those areas/skills. 20-points

(EMIs can be completed with lab 2 or 3). Feedback forms will be turned along with audio and hearing aid orientation scripts.

Course Policies/Procedures:

Academic conduct

Students enrolled in the Au.D. program must adhere to the Department and University policies on academic misconduct. Please see the
