

Criminal Justice majors are assigned a faculty advisor at the time they are approved for admission into the major. Majors <u>must</u> meet with their assigned faculty advisor during their first semester. Advising appointments are scheduled online through the EAB. Visit the CRJ website.

Students should consult other University publications and the Academic Advising Center (LSN-1013) to determine their catalog rights and to learn of all the graduation requirements which in addition to the work needed to complete an academic major in Criminal Justice.

## Required Lower Division (LD) Courses (12 units)

Criminal Justice is currently a Pre-major program. See CRJ website (<u>www.csus.edu/hhs/cj</u>) for current Pre-major and eligibility information.

To be considered for acceptance into the Criminal Justice major, students must complete the following four courses with a grade of "C" or better, have completed a minimum of 45 units, have an overall GPA of 2.5 or higher, and submit the online Eligibility Form as soon as all requirements are completed.
