FACS' Summer Fashion Academy Featured on Good Day Sacramento

In Summer 2018, Family & Consumer Sciences, in collaboration with the College of Continuing Education, offered the Summer Fashion Academies 2018 to local high school students and was featured on Good Day Sacramento. This academy was a one-week program that offered lessons and activities that examined both the design and business aspects of fashion. Professor Emeritus and Fashion Academy Instructor Ernie Olson co-lead the academy with Sacramento State instructor Esther Amato. Olson brought out the artistic side of the high school students in learning to sketch fashion designs while Amato built on the students' artistry with introducing them to design and merchandising. Over the course of five days, students were able to participate in several enriching activities that included:

- Explored and learned how an idea becomes a product and learned how products are marketed and merchandised to the public.
- Learned the fundamentals of fashion illustration, while rediscovering the art of hand drawing as a tool for creating vibrant

Launch of New Peace Corps Prep Program

A new Peace Corps Certificate Program was recently approved through the College of SSIS' curriculum committee and will be launching in Fall 2018.

Sacramento State is the first campus in the CSU system to offer such a program for undergraduates. The Peace Corps Prep program was established in 2007 and has partnerships with 75 academic institutions across the country, now including Sac State.

Developing such a program for our campus was the brainchild of Julian Heather, professor of English and the Peace Corps Prep program advisor at Sac State. The campus already had a connection to a partnership program with the Peace Corps called Masters International, through the Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). Dr. Heather first learned about the prep program when he attended the Masters International Coordinators conference in Washington D.C. in

September of 2014.

When the Peace Corps decided to end all of its Masters International partnerships in 2016, Dr. Heather thought that developing this program might be a good way to continue the connection between Sac State and the Peace Corps. With Sac State having one of the most diverse student populations in the nation, coming in 4th in the U.S. News & World Report's 2018 rankings of the top "Campus Ethnic Diversity Regional Universities" in the West, Dr. Heather felt that the campus' values matched those of the Peace Corps very well. He also felt that a prep program's focus on encouraging a diverse applicant pool for Peace Corps services is one that our campus can easily support. Thus began several years of work on the development of this program.

Dr. Heather worked with many people on campus to develop this program, in several divisions on campus and several individual faculty. In SSIS he specifically worked with both Associate Deans, Marya Endriga and Dianne Hyson, and he worked with Ajay Singh in Environmental Studies, Greg Kim-Ju from Psychology and Asian Studies, and several Department Chairs. When it came time for approving the program through the curriculum process, the proposal came through SSIS because of its interdisciplinary nature; although, the choices of courses for the students to take include almost every discipline on campus. The program is open to all undergraduates, regardless of major. Students receive specialized training that prepares them for international services, instruction in a foreign language, intercultural competence and professional leadership. Students also gain skills that prepare them for their chosen Peace Corps Work Sector including Agriculture, Community Economic Development, Environment, Health, Youth in Development, and Education.

This past March, during the week of spring break, the Political Science Department's Model United Nations (UN) delegation traveled to New York with Political Science Professor Steven Iverson to participate in the 2018 National Model UN conference. 

Clara Scarry Anthropology



r. Scarry is a biological anthropologist whose research focuses on the evolution of cooperation and collective decision-making within non-human primates, specifically individual strategies to balance the conflicting pressures of within- and between-group competition for resources. Her research addresses not only the ultimate function of collective aggression by males during betweengroup encounters but also the spatial consequences and physiological mechanisms underpinning the expression of this behavior among non-human primates. To address these questions, she integrates field- and laboratory-based methods, complementing traditional observations with behavioral experiments and hormone analysis.

r. Bao Lo is an Assistant Professor at California State University, Sacramento in the Department of Ethnic Studies. Her research interests include U.S. immigration with a focus on the second generation (children of post 1965 immigrants), race and ethnicity, and Asian Americans, with a specialization in Southeast Asian Americans and Hmong Americans.

As evidence, in the spring and summer of 2018 she: (1) gave the CSUMB College of Education & College of Science commencement keynote address, (2) designed and delivered workshops on "Power, Influence & Political Acumen" for government leaders for the USC Los Angeles County Executive Leadership Program and CPS Human Resources, and (3) designed and delivered a voter engagement training for UC Davis student government leaders.

Su Jin Jez (faculty, PPA): (1) received the 2017-2018 SSIS Outstanding Scholarly and Creative Activities Award, (2) served as an SSIS Dean's Faculty Fellow in Fall 2017 with a focus on planning for academic components related to developing a School of Public Affairs, (3) accepted a position in January as Director of the CSU Student Success Network, and (4) presented an invited talk in June at the University of Witswatersrand in Johannesburg, South Africa on "Can Systems Thinking Transform Education? FACS Department's Didactic Program in Dietetics (DPD) and Dietetic Internship (DI) programs continue to flourish. In the 2017/18 academic year both programs were fully accredited for another 7 years

by the National Accreditation Council for Education in Nutrition and Dietetics. The DI increased from 8 interns per year, to 10 beginning in fall 2018. Noteworthy, is that in spring 2018, 87% of the FACS DPD students who applied to a DI were accepted compared to the national average of 62%.

FACS concentrations are in the process of elevating to stand-alone degrees in Fashion Merchandizing and Management, Nutrition and Food, and Human Development and Family Studies. More to come....

FACS is welcoming Dr. Henry Gonzalez to the Family Studies concentration in fall 2018. We also are welcoming five additional lecturers for the fall 2018 semester: Alumna, Nancy Hamler PhD, Brian Knirk, Ed.D., Stephanie Spencer M.S. for the Nutrition and Food Concentration; and Anna Fowler B.F.A., for the Fashion Merchandising and Design Concentration.

Wendy Buchan (faculty, FACS) organized and the 16th annual Dietetic Internship Symposium in collaboration with the Northern Area California Nutrition and Dietetic Association and University of California Davis Medical Center with more than ten programs presenting and represented (CSU Sacramento, CSU Chico, CSU Fresno, UCDMC, UC Davis, UC San Francisco Medical Center, Napa State hospital, San Francisco State University, Utah Distance DI, Central Valley WIC DI).

Over 125 students attended from CSU Sacramento, UCD and CSU Chico.
