Education

Teach Asian history or languages in K-12, relocate to Asia temporarily to teach English, or consider jobs with international educational exchange programs.

Non-profit sector

Advocate for and provide services to Asian populations that also have made a home in the Sacramento region.

State or federal government jobs

Address public policy related to Asia in sectors such as the environment, trade, media, and other issues.

Private companies

Explore Asian-based companies that operate in California, perhaps in the tech or entertainment industry. You may even try to think of a start-up company yourself, an idea perhaps inspired by your study abroad experience; and if your language abilities improve, whole other areas of opportunity emerge.
