A Spark of Courage: How Renaissance Support Changes Lives ThanksGIVEday Feature Story

Recently, one of our student scholars shared a story that captures exactly why our ThanksGIVEday efforts matter so deeply.

This student came to the United States to begin a new chapter in life—balancing college classes, family responsibilities, and the challenges of adjusting to a new country. Like so many adult learners, she carried big dreams but also the weight of financial pressures, uncertainty about the future, and the daunting road ahead. As she approached the final semester of her undergraduate program, the thought of continuing toward a master's degree felt almost out of reach. Tuition, application fees, and the prospect of supporting her children through their own educational journeys made the next steps seem overwhelming. At one point, she admitted she nearly gave up. But, then something simple—and powerful—happened.

At a recent Renaissance donors' celebration, she met the people who believe in her: donors who give generously, program leaders who pour their hearts into students, and community members who show up purely to support the success of others. In her words, being surrounded by this encouragement "sparked courage" in her again. She left that evening reminded that she is not walking this road alone, and that the Renaissance community stands with her—believing in her potential and cheering her forward.

Her renewed faith in her own journey is exactly why ThanksGIVEday is so meaningful. Every gift, no matter the size, helps light the way for students who are striving to build better futures for themselves and their families. Several members have recently received email requests that appeared to be from me but were not. The first request was to "talk to me" and the second request was to "buy gift cards". A couple people did buy gift cards as requested but fortunately did not assign them to anyone.

The Holiday Season

Historically in this country the calendar months of December and January were often referred to as the Christmas and New Year holidays. In contemporary times, changing religious identity and commercial interests in particular now often refer to this time of the year as the Holiday Season. This article identifies some factual information on what has influenced this evolution.

The United States Census Bureau does not collect information on the religious identity of the population during its decennial Census. For purposes of discussion for this article, statistical information has been gleaned from a Social Studies research report by the California University Berkeley (GSS) supported in part by PEW, Reuters, and Gallup research organizations.

This is a snapshot comparison summary by percentages of the religious identity of population of the United States in 1975 and fifty years later 2025.

1975 (General Social Survey —UC Berkeley Nov. 11, 2025)

- •All Christians (total): 90% (Protestant: 62.6% and Catholic 27.4%)
- •Religions other than Christianity: 2.6% (including Jewish, Buddhist, Hindu, Muslin/other groups)
- •Religiously unaffiliated: 7.4%.

2025 (Pew Research Center Religious Landscape Study, Feb 26, 2025)

- •All Christians (total): 62% (Protestant 40% and Catholic 19% plus small shares for Latterday Saints, Orthodox, etc.).
- •Religions other than Christianity: 7.1% (Jewish 1.7%, Muslim 1.2%, Buddhist 1.1%, Hindu 0.9%, plus small other groups).
- •Religiously unaffiliated: 29% (includes 5% atheist, 6% agnostic, 19% "nothing in particular").
- •The general summary conclusion is that the overall religious identity of the Christian population in 50 years fell from 90% in 1975 to about 62% in 2025. This long-term

decline was due largely to losses among Protestants. The largest shift is the rise in the population identifying as religiously unaffiliated from 7% in 1975 to 29% in 2024. Also, the non-Christian population more than tripled from 2.6% to 9% today (driven largely by immigration and demographic change)

As a result of this change in the population demographics there are many religious and non-religious celebrations practiced in the United States during this holiday season. The list below identifies numerous celebrations by different religious and non-religious affiliate groups during months of November, December and January. (In alphabetical order)

- African American: Kwanzaa Between Christmas and New Year's celebrate African Ancestry
- Buddhist: Bodhi Day (Rohatsu) Very widely observed in the U.S. honoring Buddha's enlightenment, Dec 8th
- Christian: Christmas Day Celebrates the Birth of Jesus Christ, December 25th
- Hindu: Kartik Purnima Festival of Lights marks the Full Moon November
- **Hmong:** Hmong New Year (Not Peb Caug) marks the end of the harvest season, honors ancestors and spirits
- **Jewish:** Hanukkah Festival of Eight Nights, rededication of the Second Temple, December
- Latino: Día de la Virgen de Guadalupe (Our Lady of Guadalupe - Celebrates the appearance of the Virgin Mary to Juan Diego in Mexico, December 12th
- Muslim: Mawlid al-Nabi Prophet Muhammad's Birthday, November
- Native American: National Native American Heritage Month - November
- Non-religious celebrations: Thanksgiving Day, New Years Eve, Human Rights Day, winter festivals

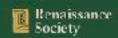

Helping Sac State Students Meet Their Basic Needs

Sac State's <u>Basic Needs Resource Center</u> (<u>BNRC</u>) is open on campus at The WELL, serving students Monday through Friday by appointment through their <u>Patient Portal</u>. Some have wondered why the campus needs this in addition to the ASI Food Pantry. The short answer: both help students facing food insecurity, but they serve different needs.

The BNRC operates under <u>Student Health</u>, <u>Counseling</u>, and <u>Wellness Services</u>, alongside the <u>CARES Office</u>, allowing students to quickly connect to other resources like emergency housing, counseling, or financial assistance. Visits are by appointment to provide students a private, personalized shopping experience.

The BNRC gratefully accepts donations of food, clothing, and parenting supplies—especially canned meats, nut butters, new or gently-used

winter coats, toiletries, diapers, and formula. Only commercially packaged food can be accepted.
