### our various learning programs

We are lucky to be living in a technology-friendly era and will continue to use these tools to deliver our programs, either in-person or hybrid mode on campus, or by Zoom in the safety and comfort of our own homes. Zoom is not difficult to use, and you'll discover new avenues of connecting with classmates through discussion groups, breakout rooms, and other interactive tools. You will get directions from your program leaders, co-leaders, or tech hosts, or in the user-friendly materials developed by our Tech Committee. As a note, many of our programs will also be recorded and available for viewing later on our member website. We offer four types of programs—Seminars, Shared Interest Groups (SIGs), One-time Presentations, and Forums.

#### **Program Definitions**

Seminars—led by one or more members, range from 3-13 weeks, and focus on one subject.

**Shared Interest Groups (SIGs)**—facilitated by members, offer activities centered on what people enjoy doing together. These groups usually meet off campus or on Zoom.

One-Time Presentations—feature a variety of single presentations by member and guest speakers.

- Monday Big History Series enrollments are open to non-members.
- Tuesday Speaker Series, Friday Morning Series; and Friday Afternoon Series require membership to attend.

**Forums**—Friday's premier speaker program held at 3 pm and features prominent community leaders who address newsworthy issues.

#### **Program Identifiers and Delivery Formats**

**Diversity (D)** programs address in detail or in part, issues encompassing various aspects of culture, race, ethnicity, religion, gender, age, ability, sexual orientation, or social economics, to foster mutual understanding, which is essential for creating inclusive environments where all individuals feel valued and respected.

**In-person and Recorded (IP+R)** programs are offered live in-person but not live on Zoom. They are recorded for future viewing.

**Selective Enrollment (SE)** programs are Friday in-person and hybrid Seminar and SIG groupings that are offered on the same dates and times. Members can sign up for in only one of the programs in each of these groupings. All other programs allow for overlapping enrollment. **NOTE:** Recorded Friday Seminars are **no longer** included in the Selective Enrollment groupings.

**Walk-in** (WI) programs allow you to enroll in advance, which allows us to notify you of last-minute program changes. However, available seats are first-come/first served.

#### Irish Immigration to America (Z/R)

Between 1845 and 1851, the potato famine in Ireland claimed 1 million lives from starvation and disease. 1.5 million immigrated to America for a better life. Ireland lost one quarter of its population. This three-part class will cover the underlying causes of the potato famine, the immigration experience, and life for the Irish immigrants once they arrived. My great grandfather, Christopher Murphy, immigrated with his family at age 4. I will trace his story to illustrate the immigrant experience.

Cathy Adams Minicucci graduated from UCLA with a BA in Anthropology and received a Master's degree from Harvard. She served as education policy staff for the California Senate and Assembly. For 30 years, she led Minicucci Associates, an evaluation consulting firm focused on programs for children and youth. Cathy has led seminars on Turning Points in American History, Profiles in American Leadership, The Great Famine and Irish Immigration to America, and The American Revolution.

### The Use and Misuse of the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM) (Z/R)

For seventy years, the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM) of the American Psychiatric Association has guided the help available for those with psychological difficulties, but not without controversy. The DSM provides official disorder definitions, but some say it unfairly labels people. Others say it helps people get the help that they've needed for years. Others say it has become a tool for the pharmaceutical industry. This class provides an overview of how the DSM came into existence, how it's changed over time, and how it works today. We'll cover depression, anxiety, childhood disorders, substance use disorders, personality disorders, and other categories. And we'll talk about alternative ways to describe mental disorders.

**Don Nikkel** is a retired clinical social worker and marriage and family therapist. He spent thirty-five years working as a counselor, clinical supervisor, and manager in programs serving youth, families, and those with mental health and substance use disorders. He went on to spend sixteen years teaching at the community college and graduate program levels. This course will focus on the material from the classes he taught in abnormal psychology.

This class reviews the US Constitution and evaluates suggested changes to it. After an introduction, two weeks will be devoted to each of five aspects of the Constitution: Citizen Rights, States Rights (Federalism), Judiciary, Executive, and Legislative. The first week reviews the current document and the second presents alternatives. After brief lecture presentations, the seminar will encourage class discussion. Courtroom dramas have long served as a powerful lens through which society examines significant social issues, using the courtroom as a stage to challenge societal norms and expose systemic ills. Each week, we will watch pivotal courtroom scenes from films that helped frame the debate on topics ranging from war crimes, evolution, and the healthcare system, to discrimination based on race, gender, and sexual orientation. ### Becoming Human: Sex Differences, Orientation, Ears (D/H/R/WI)

The seminar starts by describing the processes of human brain development, pre- and post-natal; genetic and hormonal processes that produce two sexes; inactivation of genes on the X chromosome in females; why female is the default sex; some invisible ways that female bodies differ from males (chimerism); and some anomalies of brain and sexual development (CAH and AIS). Next, Dr. McFadden will discuss his own research, by describing the basic structures of the human auditory system; the importance of hearing to human development; the sounds **produced** by human cochleas (otoacoustic emissions, not tinnitus); the effects of sex hormones on the auditory system; and some facts about opposite-sex twins and serendipity in research.

After obtaining a doctoral degree in experimental psychology from Indiana University, he became a faculty member at the University of Texas, Austin, where he remained for 40+ years. 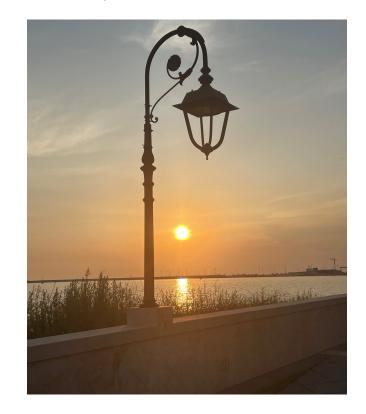

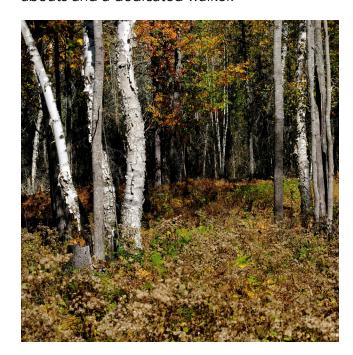

### Acoustics, Audition, and the JFK Assassination (IP+R/WI)

Earwitnesses to the assassination of Pres. Kennedy disagreed about the location of the gunman. In 1978, the House Select Committee on Assassinations conducted a partial re-enactment of that assassination. Marksmen fired rifles from the window of the TX School Book Depository and the grassy knoll, and the echo patterns were recorded. The confusion of the earwitnesses can be explained by considering the acoustics of rifle bullets and humans' ability to localize sound sources (psychoacoustics). Attendees will learn how the results of that re-enactment provided acoustical and psychoacoustical explanations for the confusion of the earwitnesses in 1963.

Dennis McFadden, PhD, graduated from Sac State in 1962. After graduate work at Indiana University, he became a faculty member in experimental psychology at the University of Texas, Austin, where he stayed for 40+ years. Dennis' research was on human hearing and sex differences. Before joining the Renaissance Society, he was a charter member of OLLI in Austin. He was a consultant for the government's partial re-enactment of the JFK assassination in 1978. He is a frequent user of the American River bike trail.

We focus on Daoism in part 1 of two illustrated presentations on China's historically intertwined religious philosophies. Dipping deep into prehistoric history, we explore the foundational roots of early Daoism, its codification into the written word by Lao Tzu (Laozi) in the later 1st millennium BCE, and its breach of cultural bounds to inform a Western practice today.

Mrea Csorba, PhD, earned three degrees in Art and Architectural history from the University of Pittsburgh (PhD 1997). For 28 years, she taught her specialties in East Asian art at her alma mater, Duquesne University, and as a visiting professor at Carnegie Mellon University. Relocating to Sacramento in 2020, Mrea continues to give presentations and gallery tours at the Crocker Museum and for other Sacramento institutions. She began her series on religious art and architecture for the Renaissance Society in fall 2024.

## Part 2: Beyond Fortune Cookies and Fengshui: Daoism and Confucianism Through the Ages (D/H/R/WI)

The second part of two illustrated presentations explores China's stages of development of Confucian philosophy as embedded in urban planning centered around ancient kings in China's state formation period. Codified into a political system by Confucius (Kong Fu Zi) and followers in the later 1st millennium BCE,

it lends hierarchical structure to state governance and social system based on the concept of "filial piety" within the traditional patriarchal construct. We look at the plan and buildings of the historic Forbidden City, as well as smaller residential architecture from more recent centuries, to see how the Confucian order still informs the daily lives of Chinese citizens.

Mrea Csorba, PhD, earned three degrees in Art and Architectural history from the University of Pittsburgh (PhD 1997). For 28 years, she taught her specialties in East Asian art at her alma mater, Duquesne University and as a visiting professor at Carnegie Mellon University. Relocating to Sacramento in 2020, Mrea continues to give presentations and gallery tours at the Crocker Museum and for other Sacramento institutions. She began her series on religious art and architecture for the Renaissance Society in fall 2024.

### Fantastical History of the Swastika (D/H/R/WI)

The swastika (Sanskrit, meaning well-being) has been a symbol of peace and joy in India for about 6,000 years. It was held in high regard by the ancient Druids, Celts, Teutonic Knights, Nordic tribes, the Second Temple in Jerusalem, Christian catacombs in Rome, and the former San Francisco mint. Before the 1930s, the swastika was a popular design in the West; many Native American tribes incorporated the swastika into their blankets, baskets, jewelry, rugs, and painted it on ceremonial pottery. We will explore the fantastical journey taken by this organic design and its ignoble use in Germany.

Gopal Kapur consults, writes, and educates on management excellence. He graduated summa cum laude with a diploma in Civil Engineering from Thapar Polytechnic, India. He authored three college-level textbooks and lectured at Harvard University, the Brookings Institution, UC Berkeley, and UC Davis. He was awarded the Distinguished Achievement Award by the President of India. He is the

founder of the Kapur Foundation, Inc., a notfor-profit, with the mission to deliver a program of nutrition education and EndLocalHunger.

She ended her career as an editorial writer for the Sacramento Bee. While at The Bee, she was a regular commentator for Capitol Public Radio. Since her retirement, Ginger has written and produced the play When We Were Colored, A Mother's Story.

A consultant and educator emeritus, her passion and expertise were workforce, economic, organization and career development, HR; managing programs and projects in public, nonprofit, and private sectors; facilitating and presenting in areas of conflict mediation, change management, intercultural, customer service, leadership, and team skills.

### Living and Learning with Dyslexia: A Family Journey (D/H/R/WI)

Attendees will leave with insights, tools, and a deeper understanding of how to support loved ones.

Jess Arce is a proud dyslexic and mother to four neurodivergent adult children. She is the founder of 3D Learning Experts, which provides personalized online instruction for students with dyslexia, dysgraphia, and dyscalculia. A best-selling author and public speaker, Jess draws from her personal, parenting, and professional journey with learning disabilities to empower families and raise awareness about the challenges and strengths of the dyslexic experience.

#### Many Journeys, Unequal Paths: Rethinking Immigration in America (D/H/R/WI)

This talk challenges the myth of a singular immigrant experience, revealing instead a history shaped by race, class, and origin. From exclusionary laws to selective opportunities, it explores how U.S. policies and perceptions have created unequal paths to belonging, and how immigrant communities have responded with resilience and impact. Key Themes: Diverse experiences, privilege and exclusion, and resilience and contribution.

Jeff Ferreira-Pro worked in technology, healthcare, community development, and finance for 35 years. Alongside that, he has been an active volunteer advocate on the Folsom History Board of Directors since 2006, where he served as board chair for 10 years. He launched Folsom History's project to create a new museum focused on the history of Chinese settlers in the Sacramento region and how their experiences contribute to the cultural diversity that is a defining element of our region today.

### Acoustics, Audition, and the JFK Assassination (D/H/R/WI)

Dennis McFadden Friday, Nov 21 1 to 2:30 pm Classroom To Be Announced

Earwitnesses to the assassination of President Kennedy disagreed about the location of the gunman. In 1978, the House Select Committee on Assassinations conducted a partial re-enactment of that assassination. Marksmen fired rifles from the window of the TX School Book Depository and the grassy knoll, and the echo patterns were recorded. The confusion of the earwitnesses can be explained by considering the acoustics of rifle bullets and humans' ability to localize sound sources (psychoacoustics). Attendees will learn how the results of that re-enactment provided acoustical and psychoacoustical explanations for the confusion of the earwitnesses in 1963.

Dennis McFadden, PhD, graduated from Sac State in 1962. After graduate work at Indiana University, he became a faculty member in experimental psychology at the University of Texas, Austin, where he stayed for over 40 years. Dennis's research was on human hearing and sex differences. Before joining the Renaissance Society, he was a charter member of OLLI in Austin. He served as a consultant for the government's partial re-enactment of the JFK assassination in 1978. He is a frequent user of the American River bike trail.

### Out Here Film Screening and Discussion Panel (D/H/R/WI)

Out Here is a story of redemption as social worker, Mark, who has emerged from his troubled past, works to house his Sacramento neighbors. But, as we see Mark "piecing shit together" to get people off the streets, Out Here tells a larger story about how human connection and personal conviction can offer hope when policy and politics fail.

Leslie Silver, PhD, is a clinical psychologist and the producer of the documentary short Out Here. Leslie assembled a film team in 2017 and started filming the stories of people experiencing homelessness, as well as people on the front lines working to help the unhoused. Out Here is one of these stories. Leslie hopes her film will humanize the unhoused and advance the dialogue around the homelessness problem.

State Fire Marshal Daniel Berlant reviews how CAL FIRE partners with federal, state, and local agencies and jurisdictions in addressing the growing challenges of wildfire response. In the last decade,

more than 70,000 homes and buildings in California have been destroyed by wildfires. CAL FIRE has a detailed strategy for community wildfire preparedness, emphasizing the importance of working together as a state to combat California's escalating crisis and protect communities and natural places from the impacts of catastrophic wildfires. Berlant has been with CAL FIRE for more than two decades, and for many years was the principal media spokesman for the agency during multiple major fires.

Co-founded by Poor with then-prisoners Earlonne Woods and Antwan Williams, the podcast now tells stories from inside and outside prison post-incarceration. The phenomenally popular podcast was named a Pulitzer Prize finalist in audio reporting in 2020 for bringing audiences "a consistently surprising and beautifully crafted series on life behind bars."

#### The Journey of the Sacramento Philharmonic and Opera: An Orchestra and Opera Company for the 21st Century (H/R/WI)



What does it mean to be an orchestra and opera company in the 21st century? And how has the Sacramento Philharmonic and Opera (SP&O) transitioned from an insolvent organization to one that is thriving for its

community? CEO Giuliano Kornberg traces the organization's journey: Lessons learned, trials and tribulations, and motivating factors. He invites audiences to examine how it serves as a model for what a modern orchestra and opera company can be. One of the youngest symphony CEOs in the country, he has been with SP&O for nearly 10 years, previously serving as Chief Revenue and Development Officer, vastly increasing revenue through subscriptions, donations, and fundraising.

### Research Across the Globe in French and English (D/H/R/WI)



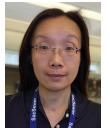

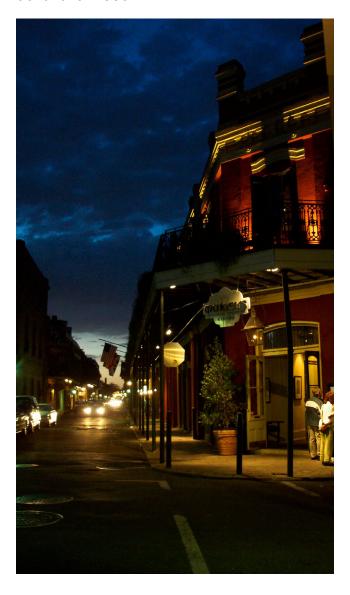

## Renaissance Society Code of Conduct

Revision 2024

The Renaissance Society is dedicated to providing a welcoming and supportive environment for all people, regardless of background or identity. By participating in activities and events sponsored by the Renaissance Society, participants accept to abide our Code of Conduct and accept the procedures by which any Code of Conduct incidents are resolved. The Renaissance Society does not tolerate behavior that is disrespectful or that excludes, intimidates, or causes discomfort to others. We do not tolerate discrimination or harassment based on characteristics that include, but are not limited to, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation, disability, physical appearance, body size, citizenship, nationality, ethnic or social origin, pregnancy, familial status, veteran status, genetic information, religion or belief (or lack thereof), membership of a national minority, property, age, education, socio-economic status, technical choices, and experience level.

Everyone who participates in seminars, workshops, forums, and presentation activities is required to conform to this Code of Conduct. It applies to all spaces managed by or affiliated with the Renaissance Society. Program hosts/leaders are expected to assist with the enforcement of the Code of Conduct. By participating, participants and program leaders indicate their acceptance of the procedures by which the Renaissance Society resolves any Code of Conduct incidents,

#### **Standards of Conduct**

All participants in our events and communications are expected to show respect and courtesy to others. All interactions should be professional regardless of platform: either online or in-person. In order to foster a positive and professional learning environment we encourage the following kinds of behaviors in all Renaissance Society events and platforms:

- Use welcoming and inclusive language and discussion.
- Be respectful of different viewpoints and experiences.
- Gracefully accept constructive criticism.
- Show courtesy and respect towards Renaissance Society members and guests!

#### **Unacceptable Conduct**

Examples of unacceptable behavior by participants at any Renaissance Society Programs include:

- Engage in written or verbal comments, which have the effect of excluding people on the basis of membership of any specific group.
- Silence, prevent, or limit participation of members.
- Cause someone to fear for their safety such as by stalking, following, or intimidation.
- Violent threats or language directed against another person.
- The display of sexual or violent images.
- Nonconsensual or unwelcome physical contact.
- Sustained disruption of talks, events, or communications.
- Using insults. put downs, sexist, racist, homophobic, transphobic, disability discrimination, or exclusionary jokes.
- Excessive swearing.
- Continuing to initiate through actions or interaction (including photography or recording) someone after being asked to stop.
- Publication of public or private communication without consent.

#### **Consequences of Unacceptable Conduct**

Purported violations should be reported to the Renaissance Society Program Committee Chair. If the Program Committee Chair determines that the violation cannot be resolved by verbal communication, the issue will be submitted to the Program Committee for further investigation and arbitration. Members are asked to stop any code of conduct violations as determined by the Program committee immediately. In serious circumstances where a resolution cannot be accomplished or violations continue, a member may be asked to leave the event or program. In the case of unresolved violation(s) by program leader(s), the Program Chair will report such violations to the full Renaissance Society Board, which may impose appropriate sanctions such as non-acceptance for the Renaissance Society Catalog of Programs and or denial of sanctioning by the Renaissance Society.

## sac state library services for members

#### Considering paying for library access?

Purchase a library card if you want limited access to public research computers or to borrow physical materials from the library's general collection. You can borrow books, music CDs, and videos.

#### What services are associated with a library card?

- 3-week loan period for library materials
- Materials auto-renew every 3 weeks, no need to call or visit the library
- Borrow up to 15 items at a time
- Access to public research computers (2 hours per day)
- Must be a current Renaissance Society member
- Library card expires June 30th of the current academic year

#### What services are NOT associated with a library card?

- Holds and requests may not be placed on library materials
- Interlibrary loan
- Remote access to research databases
- Access to reserved study room spaces
- Circulating materials dedicated for student use only (e.g. laptops, calculators, etc.)

#### How do I get a library card?

**Step 1:** Register with the Renaissance Society Office to become a Renaissance Society member, and pay the associated \$10.00 library card fee. You can pay by credit card or check. Please mail check to 6000 J St., Mail Stop 6074, Sac CA 95819–6074, or you can drop it by our office at 350 University Ave. Suite 108. Office Hours: Monday-Friday 10-1.

**Step 2:** Visit the University Library Service Desk (1st floor) to activate your library account and claim your library card.



## why badges?

For those On-campus: Prior to Covid and at the request of Sac State, Renaissance Society members were badges to on-campus activities. The badges identify us as a group to the university and as individuals to each other. They also provide the all-important emergency contact information on the reverse side. Our membership forms for new and renewing registrants ask for this information. To order a badge, email your name and emergency contact person's name and phone number to renaissa@csus.edu.

For Zoom attendees: We ask that you identify yourselves in a such a way that the program leader can find you on the Program Enrollment List. Your emergency contact information appears on all program enrollment lists.



## parking permits

If you join or renew for the 2025-2026 academic year, you will be able to purchase a new \$42 parking permit. This parking permit is valid until June 30, 2025. If you do not purchase a parking permit, you will need to pay either \$4 for two hours or \$8 for the day when you are on campus. If you need additional help, you can contact University Transportation and Parking Services (UTAPS) at 916- 278-7275 or parking@csus.edu.

Sac State offers virtual parking permits (no placard in your windshield required). Instead, your car license number will be used and scanned by parking officials when you are on campus. You cannot pay for parking in the Renaissance Society registration system: You must pay through <u>University Transportation and Parking Services (UTAPS)</u>.

#### **Online Option**

You can find the parking permit information at the link above. Click on the Purchase Permit button and either click on Guest Login or Guest Signup. If you purchased a parking permit last year, use the Guest Login button and use your UTAPS email and password to log in and purchase a parking permit. Use the Guest Signup button if you do not already have an account. Be sure to select the \$42 option if you see multiple choices for permits. If your Renaissance Society membership is current, but you do not see the Renaissance Society Parking option, please contact UTAPS.

#### **In-person Option**

This permit enables members to park in parking structures or lots, where you can park in student or employee spaces. And, if you have a handicap permit or placard, the paid parking permit plus your handicapped placard allows you to park in all designated spaces. **Note:** The Renaissance Society permits are valid for Fridays and Saturdays ONLY. They are NOT valid for Faculty, Staff, or Student Residence lots. The current fine is \$55.

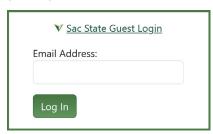
## wi-fi tips for on campus and at home

## **Connecting to Sac State Wireless on Campus**

When on campus you can connect to the free Sacramento State Guest wireless network. This will allow you to text, check your emails, or browse the internet before classes start or on breaks.

## To connect to the guest wireless network, follow these steps.

- 1. Open the Settings app on your phone
- 2. On iPhone Click on the Wi-Fi tab and select SacLink Guest Network Access.
- 3. On Android phones click on Network & Internet then Internet
- 4. Your browser should automatically open and you should be prompted to enter an email address.



This should be your personal email address, not a Sac State one.

- 5. Click the Login button
- 6. Once completed, you should now have wireless access.

**Reminder**—Your wireless access must be renewed every 4 hours.

\*\*Note—If your browser does not automatically open, open your browser manually and enter this link, <a href="https://wireless.webhost.csus.edu/">https://wireless.webhost.csus.edu/</a> then enter your email address and proceed to Step 5.

If you use Wi-Fi to connect with your Renaissance Society Zoom meetings at home, you may enjoy these tips to improve the strength and security of your Wi-Fi signal:

Router Location: Place your router in a central location in your home, ideally off the floor on a shelf or desk. This helps the Wi-Fi signal reach all parts of your home with less interference from walls and furniture.

Wi-Fi band: Most home routers transmit on two Wi-Fi bands: 5 GHz and 2.4 GHz. The 5 GHz band offers faster speeds but shorter range, while the 2.4 GHz band offers better range but slower speed. Your device may choose the best band automatically, but if it doesn't, use the Wi-Fi signal bars to select the stronger choice.

Router security: Turn the router's power off and then back on again occasionally. This will improve its performance and eliminate some malware. Keep your router's software up to date. If the router's website is no longer providing software updates for your router, consider replacing it with a newer model.

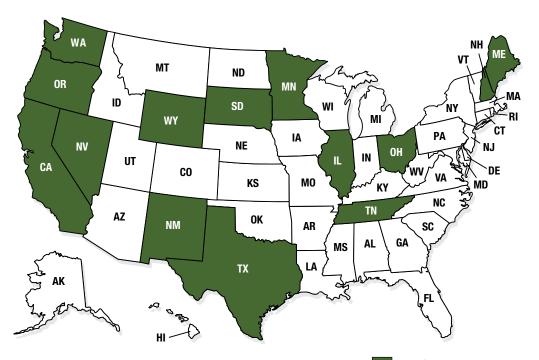


## partnerships
