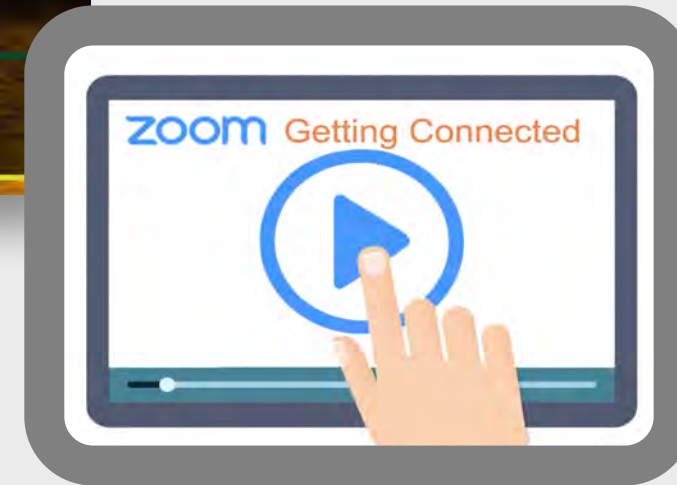

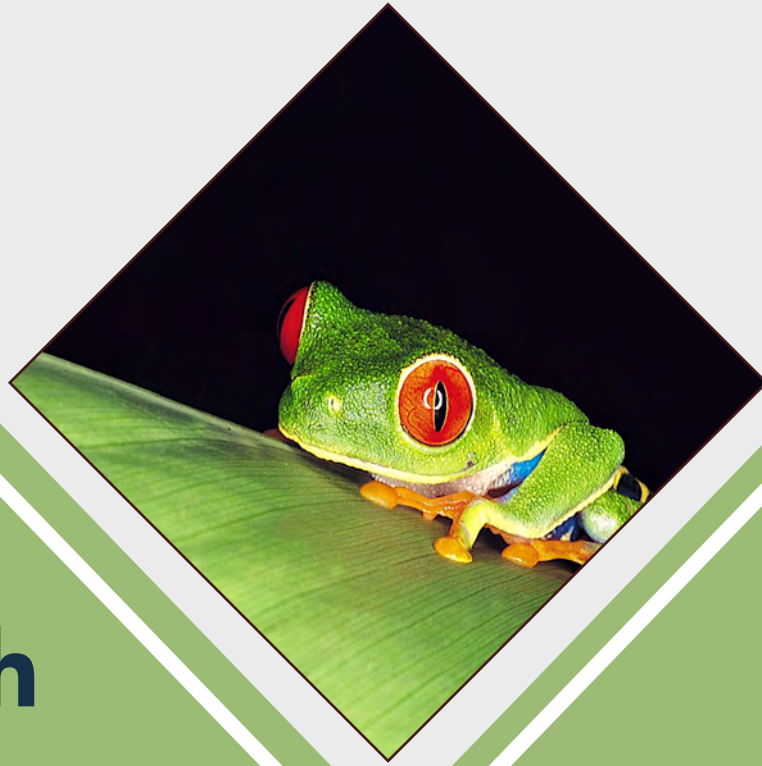


Renaissance Society COVID Safety Plan Protocols



To participate this Fall 2022 semester in RS programs on the Sac State campus requires:

- 1. Be fully vaccinated** – RS members are required to be fully vaccinated to participate in RS indoor programs on the Sac State campus. *On Dec. 22, 2021, the CSU Chancellor's office announced that it requires faculty, staff and students to receive booster shots to be fully immunized against COVID-19 and comply with the CSU Vaccination Policy.* As a third-party event, RS program participation allows no medical or religious exemptions. Virtual participation is still an option for distance learning.
- 2. Vaccination self-attestation** - Members will read, complete and sign a vaccination self-attestation sheet when entering their RS program classrooms for each session. Attestation will include showing your COVID-19 Vaccination Record Card.
- 3. Face masks** – The wearing of face masks is optional when attending programs on the Sac State campus. Members are expected to bring their own face masks. Everyone should feel free to wear face coverings, and no one should be shamed for wearing them.
- 4. Social distance** - Everyone is encouraged to social distance to whatever extent possible within the classrooms. This is not required by the current university policies but is desired to honor RS members' safety wishes expressed in RS surveying. A minimum distance of three feet and a preferred distance of six feet is the RS social distancing standard.

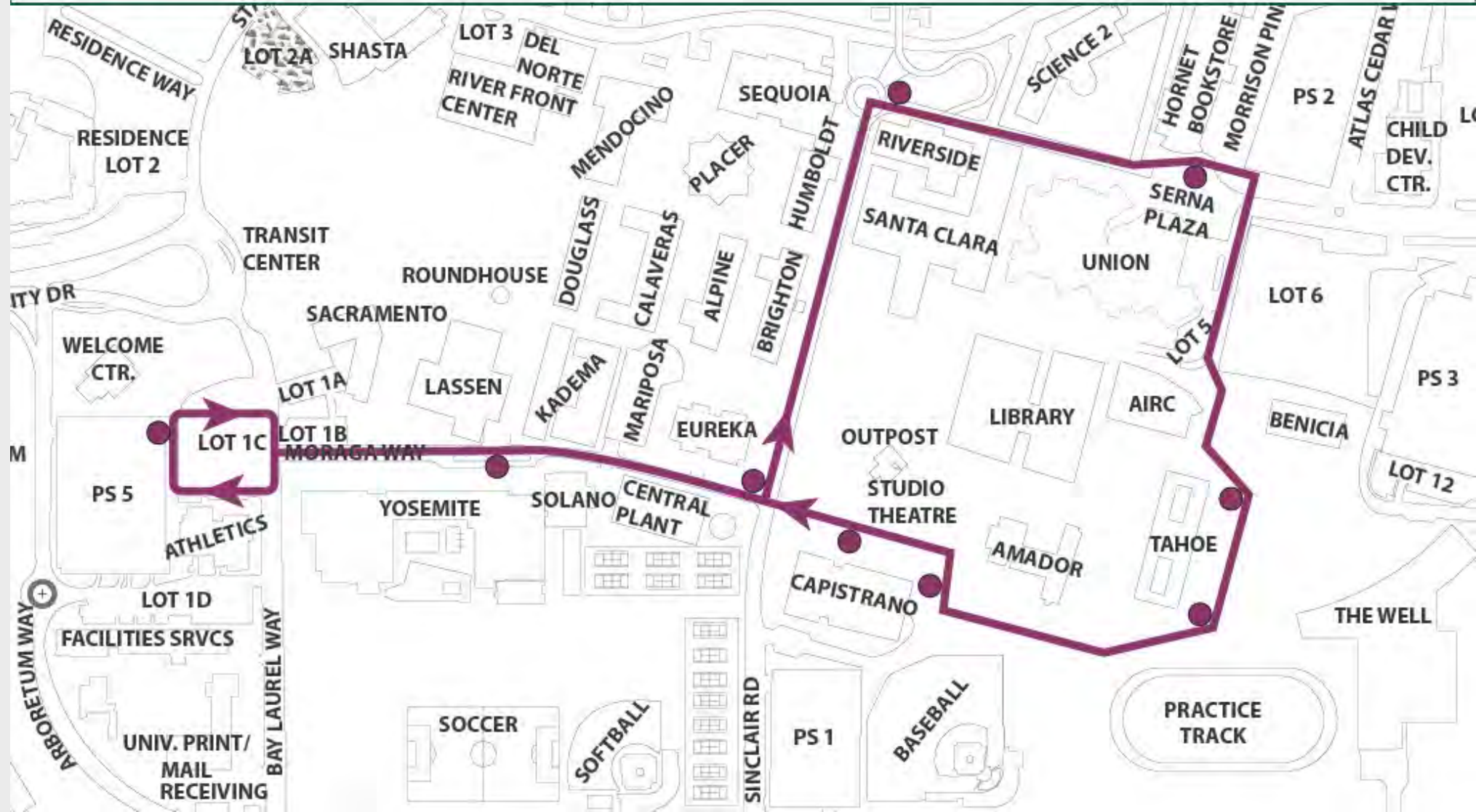

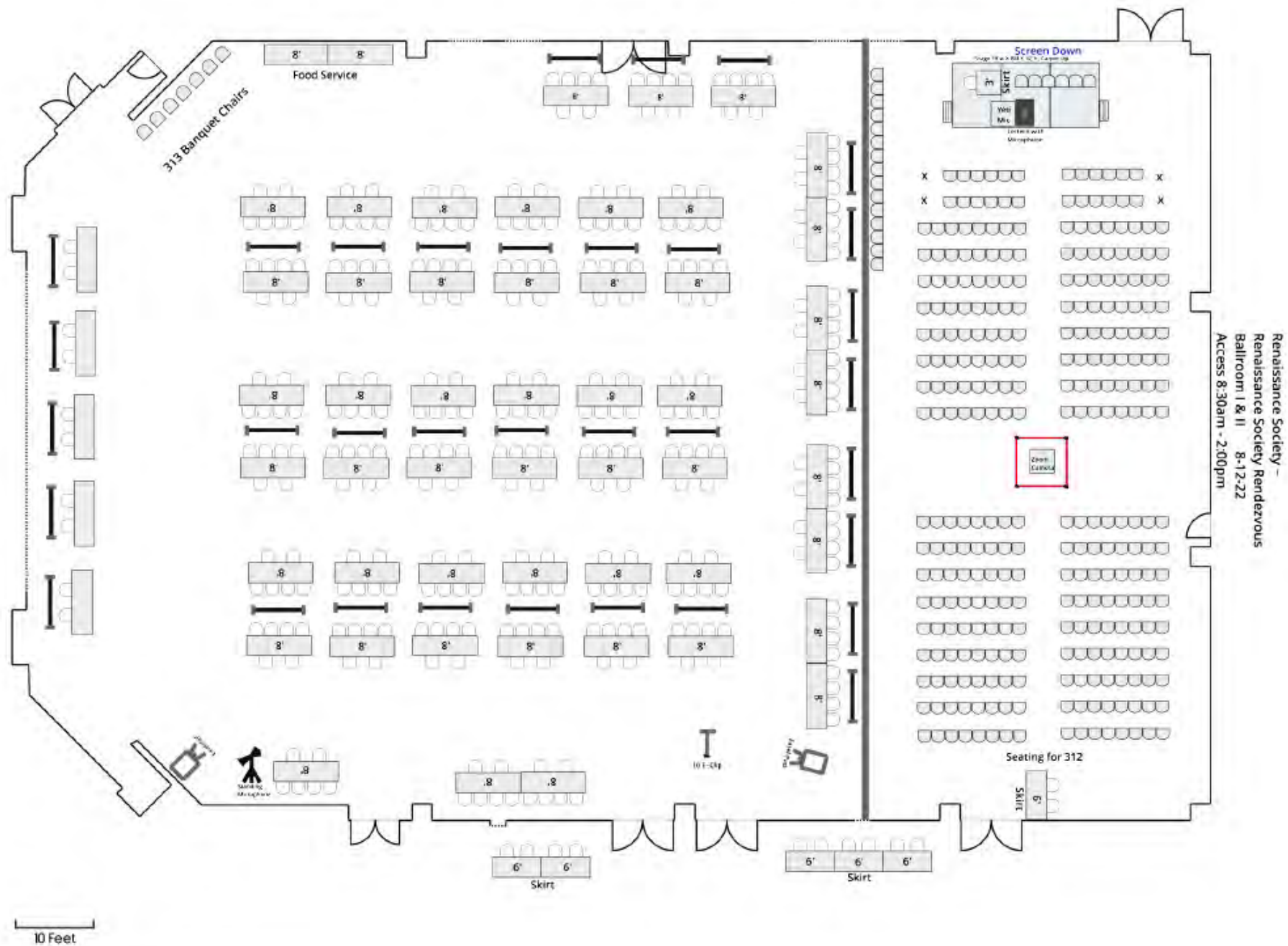




Renaissance Society Accessibility Guidelines



- **Speak slowly and clearly**, with face and mouth visible to all seminar participants whenever speaking.
- **Use the classroom sound system** – lavalier or handled microphone.
- **Use portable microphones** for comments or questions by seminar participants.
- **Always repeat or summarize** what is asked or said by each seminar participant.
- **Never engage in a discussion** with participants in the front rows that is not repeated or summarized for all participants to understand.
- **When possible**, activate the subtitles or closed captioning of any video that is shown during a seminar.
- **Use Zoom closed-captioning** subtitles and transcription features.
- **Leave front seats vacant** for those with hearing/understanding, vision, and mobility limitations.
- **Remember the Herky Streetcar** is available for RS members with mobility issues.

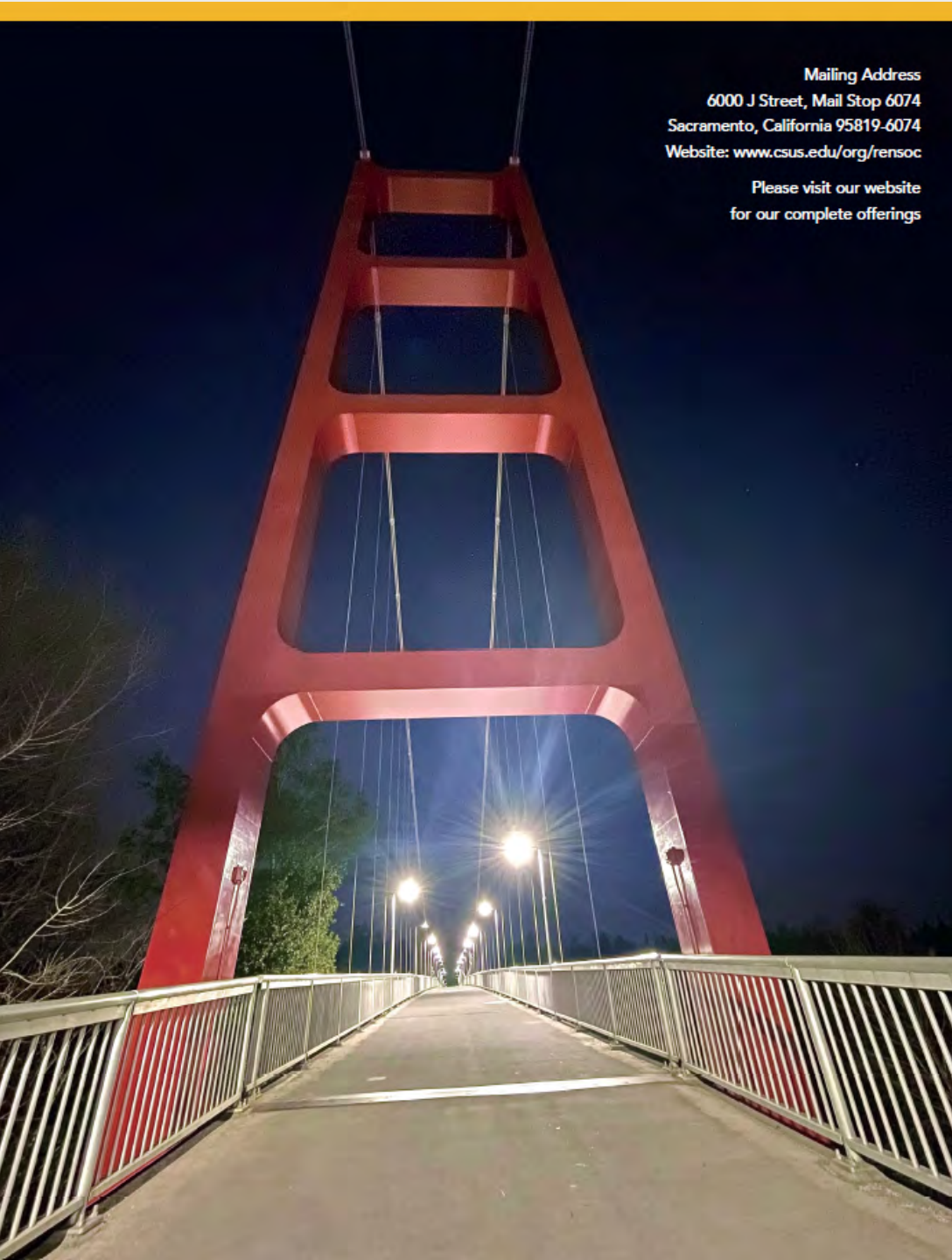
