In light of today's standards for privacy and transparency, we introduced a formal consent form this year, developed in partnership with the Sacramento State Scholarship Team. He earned a Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering from the University of Hawaii and a Master's degree in the same field from the University of Southern California.

After spending 33 years working in the aerospace industry in Southern California, Alan took an early retirement at 56. He then worked for Aerojet in Rancho Cordova for nine years, retiring fully in 2015.

Alan met his wife Amy, (also a Renaissance Society member), in Hong Kong, where their families were acquainted. The couple has five grandchildren—two from their son in Roseville and three from their son in France. Four years ago, Alan and Amy moved from Folsom to El Dorado Hills.

This fall, Alan plans to host a Renaissance seminar series titled *Hidden Treasures of Folsom*, featuring local experts. Topics will include Northern California's Chinese Immigrant history, evolution of Folsom history, the Folsom Powerhouse, the



American history, watershed systems and riparian habitats, and the Folsom Zoo Sanctuary.

#### **Cultural Transitions in America**

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Many American journalists, cultural commentators, academics, and of course politicians speculate that

the United States is experiencing for better or for worse, accelerated cultural change. The driving force behind this era of acceleration is what is known as the contemporary "Digital Revolution". There are a variety of social, political and economic factors that influence this conjecture.

Our country's historic "Industrial Revolution" transformed American society culturally by shifting people to cities, changing family life, encouraging new consumer habits, deepening class divides, and introducing legal waves of immigrants. This economic movement laid the foundation for a pluralistic modernization of American society. This country's contemporary "Digital Revolution" has impacted American society in a similar manner. Rapid technological advances in the last few decades have created entirely new consumer purchasing habits by way of the internet that challenges traditional "brick and mortar" shopping. Additionally, the internet and social media activities have transformed how ideas, opinions, and cultural trends spread, making elements of societal change much faster, more visible, and more concerning for large segments of the population.

Subsequently, the U.S. population has become more diverse with younger generations being more multicultural and globally connected. Social-political identity movements since the 1960s have precipitated rapid progress (and backlash) on social and cultural issues. This "Age of Acceleration\*", influenced by advanced computer technology, has arguably impacted American society to the point that cultural divisions in the population have the appearance of being more divisive than ever, with political beliefs shaping how people consume media, talk about history, relate to their neighbors, and think about the future.

There's a strong case that the U.S. is experiencing faster cultural shifts compared to previous decades.

However, it's important to note that cultural change is often uneven — while some communities em-

brace change intensely, others may see it as less dramatic and/or even resist it.

The urban-rural divide in the U.S. is real and profound as evidenced by the geo-political rhetoric and geographical voter response in the last national elections. Urban communities tend to be more progressive, diverse, and accepting of rapid social changes. Rural communities tend to espouse traditional

values, stronger religious faith, and tight-knit social communality. The MAGA movement articulates a challenge to "urban elitism," perceived by populations in rural communities, who feel their way of life is devalued or misunderstood and governments have not been responsive to their needs. Urban areas have more exposure to global cultures and economic opportunities in technology, finance, and creative sectors. Rural areas are more tied to agriculture, manufacturing, or resource extraction and often feel economically suppressed.

Urban dwellers are more likely to be immersed in diverse media ecosystems that reinforce cosmopolitan values. Rural residents rely more on local news, faith-based networks, or conservative media outlets, leading to a different worldview than urban populations. These cultural divides are strongly reflected in political expressions. Rural areas lean conservative, while urban areas trend liberal, contributing to the perceived intense polarization.

This transition period of accelerated economic, political and cultural change is creating both opportunities (broader acceptance, diversity, innovation) and tensions (backlash, polarization, alienation). Bridging these divides requires understanding and respecting different lived experiences while working to address underlying economic and social inequalities.
