Ever inspirational and armed with facts, President Robert S. Nelsen on August 25 shared a brief history of Sac State's 75-year history, beginning with its initial, unwelcome presence on the Sacramento City Junior College campus when five faculty had to squeeze their classes before and after city college classes and during their noon hours. Eventually the campus moved to a former restaurant facility where professors used ovens as file cabinets, with one mishap burning a complete set of files. By 1952, the cornerstone was laid at Sac Hall.

Calling education "a sacred profession," President Nelsen celebrated Sac State's current enrollment at 11% above its goal, and he noted the graduation of 9,435 students last May. He pointed with pride to the 187% increase in four-year graduation rates.

President Nelsen's call for diversity is more than just a fine speech. He noted the student body, once made up of former GIs and overwhelmingly white, is now 31% Latino and the fourth most diverse campus in the Western United States. Diversity goals have resulted in a new Native American Center and a doubling of the MLK, Jr., Dreamer's, and Serna centers. Most recently the university acquired a \$500,000 grant for a house for formerly incarcerated students, entitled Project Rebound.

"Sac State is a transformative university, a healing university," he said. His speech was a celebration of a successful \$238 million "On the Rise" campaign, the long-delayed award of 7% raises for faculty and staff, and technological upgrades to 420 classrooms.

President Nelsen said there is no change to covid requirements to be vaccinated and boosted. Wearing face masks is optional and testing is only required if the person is showing symptoms.

Looking ahead, he noted the recent grant of a 300-acre site in Placer County and said planning efforts for the next 75 years are underway. As Sac State prepares to celebrate its 75<sup>th</sup> "diamond" anniversary. President Nelsen proclaimed, "We have not just endured, we have thrived."

### Volunteer Highlights

On the technical side, Marian organizes tech hosts for our virtual programs and writes instructional guides, posted on our website, to help members with Zoom. What very few members see is Marian's utterly calm face behind the scenes of our virtual productions of Orientation and Rendezvous, Seminar Leader Workshops, and our Annual Meeting. She determines the flow, sets up the programming, and guides presenters through the process. And apples don't fall far from the tree, as the saying goes. One of Marian's two accomplished progeny, daughter Jen Mahlke, recently came up from Cal Poly to wow Renaissance seminar leaders with her inspirational presentation on teaching. Imagine where she learned the art of that!?!

Chris Smith: Chris and his wife, Julia, joined Renaissance in 2014. Chris has been an active member of the Photography in Art class since 2015 and served as its tech host since covid. Importantly, Chris has done the heavy technical lifting for the Forum Committee since it went virtual. He's set up webinars, done video editing for Forum recordings on the website, coached Forum speakers with pre-meeting login information and flow of the presentation, produced informational slides, and recently created a spreadsheet with login information for Fall 2022 Forums. And he created the Forum YouTube channel and edited the videos that have been viewed over 11,500 times. Whew! That's not even a complete list, but it gives you an idea of the vast array of his talents and contributions. Thanks, Chris!
