

Who has rights in the United States?



EVERYONE, regardless of immigration status, regardless of criminal history has certain rights!

What Rights Do We Have?



Fifth Amendment

- Right to remain silent and due process of law
- Can refuse to sign documents
- Can refuse to give documents

Fourth Amendment

- Right against unreasonable searches and seizures
- ICE and law enforcement cannot enter a person's home or search a person's belongings without permission
- They virtually never have a judicial warrant. DO NOT GIVE THEM PERMISSION

Sixth Amendment

- Right to legal counsel on criminal (but not immigration)
- Right to be advised on crim/imm consequences





Why do we remain silent?



ICE can only deport you if they have **proof** you are not a citizen

- <u>DO NOT</u> give them proof by answering questions or providing documents
- Especially don't say where you are from, where you were born, or your nationality.

Key is to assert your Fifth Amendment right before ICE

- Where are you from? "I assert my right to remain silent"
- Where were you born? "I assert my right to remain silent"
- What is your nationality? "I assert my right to remain silent"

Goal: Avoid arrest entirely! But even if ICE illegally arrests you, asserting your right preserves valuable defense in deportation proceedings!





What if I encounter ICE in the community?



Walking, driving, and other public spaces:

- Assert your right to remain silent
- Do not sign anything
- Remain calm
- Do not consent to a search of your person or your property
- Do this even if you have status! Everyone should assert their rights!
- If driving, driver should show driver's license
- Do ask if you are free to go
- Do not run; do not speed away
- Do not provide any false documents

Judicial Warrant – Search Warrant

- It must describe sufficiently the residence to be searched
- Signed by a Judge

CSU Policy



Will University Police Officers work with federal immigration officers to apprehend and remove individuals from campus, absent evidence of a judicial warrant?

A: University police officers will not contact, detain, question or arrest an individual solely on the basis of suspected undocumented immigration status or to discover the immigration status of any individual, and University Police (UPD) will not undertake joint efforts with federal immigration enforcement authorities to investigate, detain or arrest individuals for violation of federal immigration law

CSU Policy



Can CSU prevent federal immigration enforcement officers from coming onto campus or entering CSU property?

A: Generally, no. CSU is a public university and a large portion of CSU property is open to the general public. The areas on campus that are open to the general public are also open to federal immigration enforcement officers. CSU does not have authority to prohibit federal immigration enforcement officers from coming on campus to those public areas even if their purpose is to enforce federal law. However, public access is limited in certain areas of CSU universities and property because of privacy concerns, operational needs, or safety considerations. University buildings and spaces in which access is physically restricted, such as by key card, locked doors or monitored entryways, including university housing, fall into this category.

CSU Policy



What federal immigration enforcement officers might seek access to the campus, and what authority do they have?

A: The immigration officers who seek to apprehend and remove (or "deport") an individual unlawfully present in the United States are most often officers of ICE...These federal officers work for, or on behalf of the DHS and they are typically acting on civil, not criminal, authority. The warrants these officers carry to apprehend individuals are generally administrative warrants that do not authorize officers to enter nonpublic areas of the University without consent. See Question 6 below for discussion of the differences between types of warrants

If ICE seeks access to your Campus



Personnel should immediately refer the federal official and his/her request to the Office of the President/Chancellor. The Office of the President/Chancellor will, in turn, work with the District's General Counsel to make a final determination on whether the request is lawful.

Silence is Golden!



If arrested



DO:

- Tell ICE if you fear return to your home country
- Respond honestly to questions about name, address, and date of birth
 - But do not say anything to anyone about your status, except to your attorney!
- Otherwise, assert your right to remain silent

DO NOT:

- Resist arrest, do not run
- Sign anything or make any decisions without a lawyer
- Answer questions about your immigration status or country of origin when ICE comes to question you at the detention center



Witnessing ICE activity: Can I Record?

- First Amendment right to record law enforcement activity in public view
 - But do not interfere!
- Consider you may be subject to further questioning
- Prime role for U.S. citizen allies!


