

It can take up to 60 days to get DNA analysis done in a typical lab, due to heavy casework loads, but RADS is designed to get the most egregious offenders off the street as soon as possible. The program is just about a year old now."

Dear SSM Eschleman:

I would like to recognize the hard work and dedication of Analyst Sara Morin in the Jasyn Bigasan-Carter Human Trafficking case and conviction.

In April 2020, West Sacramento Police responded to a domestic violence call at a motel on West Capitol Avenue. They contacted the first victim, who had recently turned 18 years old, and learned that she had been trafficked by Bigasan-Carter for the previous two months. West Sacramento Police Detectives immediately opened an investigation and discovered a second minor victim who lived out of county. Investigation revealed Bigasan-Carter had been involved in human trafficking since January 2020.

Large amounts of electronic evidence was seized in this case, including gigabytes of phone, cloud and social media-based data. A DA Investigator contacted VCISS for assistance in data analysis and location mapping. Analyst Sara Morin was assigned the case, and she worked her way through the massive amounts of data which including videos, social media productions, cell phone extractions and call detail records. She was able to identify numerous instances of trafficking of both adult and juvenile victims that spanned multiple states and multiple counties in California. Her analysis assisted the investigators in the on-going investigation and her final work product, a detailed PowerPoint of location mapping and communications, clearly detailed Bigasan-Carter's involvement in the trafficking of juvenile and adult victims.

On July 30, 2021 Bigasan-Carter pled no contest to multiple crimes including sex trafficking of a minor, pimping a minor, felon in possession of a firearm, and dissuading a witness. He will be sentenced in October of 2021 and is facing 29 years and 4 months state prison.

Analyst Morin showed a willingness to tackle a very challenging case involving a large amount of analysis and data. The quality of her work product was excellent, and our office appreciates her dedication to the mission of seeking justice for our most vulnerable victims.

Dear 2025 Distinguished Alumni Award Committee,

Thank you for the opportunity to write a letter of support for Kinzie S. Murphy's nomination for a Sacramento State 2025 Distinguished Alumni Award in the area of Distinguished Service.

Kinzie is an exceptional alumna of our University. In 1986 she completed her thesis (*Stop Consonant Production in Maxillectomy Speakers*), earning a Master of Science Degree in Speech Pathology and Audiology. This marked the commencement of a truly remarkable career. Along her professional journey, she has practiced as a school-based language, speech, and hearing Specialist in the Sacramento City Unified School District, as a hospital-based speech-language pathologist (SLP) for Sutter Healthcare, as a consultant in classroom oral feeding issues for the Sacramento County Office of Education and the Walton Special Education Center in the Stockton Unified School District, as a speech-language pathologist for Remedy Rehab and Helping Hands, as a State Speech Pathology Consultant for the California State Department of Health Services, as an oral feeding specialist for Easter Seals Superior California, and as an instructor and clinical instructor in the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders at Sacramento State. It goes without saying that the *breadth and depth* of her work has positively impacted our community in **all** service delivery settings in **all** disorder areas **across the lifespan**. It is no surprise that she is recognized by students, staff, faculty, and community professionals as a "go-to" consultant on diverse issues surrounding speech-language pathology. Her kind, compassionate, and highly competent service delivery have made her a favorite of her clients and patients, particularly infants and children, who are drawn to her gentle approach.

Kinzie's contributions to the community also stand out. As an example, the California Speech-Language-Hearing Association (CSHA) is an organization to which she has provided much volunteer service in several positions since she became a member as a new SLP in 1987. She is a former CSHA District 2 (Sacramento to Oregon Border) Director-Elect (2000-2002) and Director (2002-2004) and she served as the appointed CSHA Commissioner on Legislation from 2005-2007 and again from 2007-2009, positions that I subsequently held. I began working with her closely as Director-Elect in 2004 and was immediately impressed by her dedicated work, coupled with an innate ability to engage the District and the state as a whole, diligently representing the membership to the Board and sharing Board information with her constituencies. She was an outstanding mentor to me, allowing me to learn and grow before beginning my terms as Director-Elect, Director, and

Commissioner on Legislation. I am just one recipient of her outstanding teaching and mentorship, as you will see later in this letter. Kinzie also participated in the CSHA Director's Caucus in 2003-2004 and served on the CSHA Executive Council from 1989-1990. She has been a member of the District 2 Advisory Council many times and she has volunteered as a CSHA convention moderator and PAC volunteer countless times. It is no wonder that she was awarded the CSHA District 2 Outstanding Service Award in 2006 and was named CSHA Fellow in 2010 for her service to the organization and to the field of Communication Sciences and Disorders. I am also pleased to report that it was recently announced that Kinzie has received 2025 Honors of the Association from CSHA. This is the highest honor given by the association and recognizes contributions to the organization and distinguished service in the areas of clinical service, research and publications, and teaching. Further, Kinzie has provided perennial support to the Maryjane Rees Language, Speech, and Hearing Center Audiology and Speech and Language Clinics at Sacramento State, including serving as an ambassador during the Department of Communication Sciences and Disorders Capital Campaign that helped equip and furnish the new donations-only clinics in Folsom Hall that provide services to over 900 community members each year without a fee for service. She was also a charter member on the Human Services/Community Cohort of the College of Health and Human Resources Center for Health Practice, Policy, and Research (CHPPR) Community Advisory Council, where she remains dedicated to impacting community health by promoting collaboration, inter-disciplinary practice, and innovation to reduce health inequities in California's capital region. Her work on the Council includes sharing professional expertise, working to connect CHPPR to local, national, and international resources, colleagues, and peers, and providing leadership in philanthropic endeavors.

Kinzie has made a lasting and positive impact on undergraduate and graduate students in the fields of speechlanguage pathology and audiology. Since 1988, she has provided education and mentorship to hundreds of students completing their didactic and clinical practica in the field of speech-language pathology, helping them successfully earn their degrees and, ultimately, earn the required California state license and credential, as well as the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) Certificate of Clinical Competence. I will share that I learned from Kinzie when I was a student at Sacramento State and I have continued to learn from her as a colleague. During my time as Professor and Chair in Communication Sciences and Disorders, I watched students gravitate to her naturally because she exudes competence. They quickly realize that her ability to combine academic rigor with compassion is nothing short of an art form and her peers frequently remark on her unparalleled dedication to student success in our fields. As just one example, Kinzie had decided to retire from her Clinical Instructor position at Sacramento State just before the COVID-19 pandemic. When I called her to say that we desperately needed help with clinical instruction in the Adult Neuro clinic, she didn't miss a beat. By the next morning, she had converted all of her materials to allow for tele supervision and began instruction with a keen eye on student self-care while embarking on a journey into uncharted territory. The clients and the student clinicians that spent the pandemic learning and growing with Kinzie remain forever grateful for that gift. This resonates with Kinzie's longstanding understanding of the challenges students face in their educational journeys, as further exemplified by her support of the Sacramento State Guardian Scholars Program and her establishment of the Communication Sciences and Disorders Alumni Scholarship in 1995, which has provided financial support to generations of students.

Kinzie has received recognition and professional attention both at home and abroad for her contributions and expertise in our field. A review of her resume reveals that she has presented over 30 workshops, seminars, and papers in California and internationally on a variety of topics, with a primary focus on oral feeding and swallowing disorders in infants and children. The content of the presentations is the result of years of interprofessional clinical practice, collaboration, and research in this area, which is further underscored by her 2002 co-authored publication in CSHA Magazine (*Developing a Collaborative Interagency Approach to Feeding and Swallowing Problems in School-Aged Children*). Beginning in 2005, Kinzie's unique skill set was sought by the University of Hawaii Research Corporation. She served as part of a team that travelled regularly to American

Samoa, performing culturally appropriate assessments and screenings for school-aged children with suspected speech, language, and hearing problems, performing oral feeding assessments and developing recommendations, and providing in-services and special education evaluations, while simultaneously supervising Sacramento State speech-language pathology students as part of an international learning experience. In 2007, this developed into a regular quarterly rotation with the Helping Hands Early Intervention Program. As such, Kinzie served as a consultant to the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Part C program, providing critical and much-needed speech-language pathology and oral feeding services to children birth to three years of age in American Samoa for a number of years.

Conclusion

In conclusion, it is clear that Kinzie is a passionate, dedicated, and widely acclaimed clinician, teacher, and mentor in the field of Speech-Language Pathology. Her sustained, outstanding contributions to CSHA, to Sacramento State and its students, to our health and human service professions, to our community and to the international community, and the positive impact this has had on the clients we serve and their families stand out. Further, she has conducted professional education for countless students and professionals over the years, providing them invaluable and practical, scientifically-based strategies for service delivery to clients from a variety of cultural and linguistic backgrounds across the lifespan. She is a source of pride for her alma mater, Sacramento State, and for our profession. I believe that Kinzie's distinguished achievements and contributions at home and abroad make her a most worthy recipient of a 202r Distinguished Alumni Service Award and I encourage you to consider bestowing this honor upon her.

Attorney General Awards CSLEA Members for Achievements in 2016

SACRAMENTO – On October 10, 2017, California Attorney General Xavier Becerra held an awards ceremony at the Courtyard Marriott Midtown, to thank Department of Justice employees for their excellent work and outstanding accomplishments.

Among those awarded were California Statewide Law Enforcement Association (CSLEA and California Association of Law Enforcement Employees (CALEE Members Reva Headley, Sara Morin, and Ashlee Onwurah. The three received recognition for their work on the Violent Crime Investigation Support Team.



Also awarded were CSLEA-CALEE Members Carmen Keeler, Samira Nassar, Marie Perez-Gonzalo, and Sarah Wesley for their work on the APPSHistoricalTeam.



In addition, Attorney General Becerra recognized CSLEA – Association of Criminalists-DOJ Members from Sacramento, Ripon, Fresno, Redding and Eureka for excellence in Rapid DNA Service.

"The RADS program is designed to get the most probative DNA samples in sexual assaults analyzed in 20 days or less," said John Miller, president of AC-DOJ. "The law requires this be done in four months (120 days), but the DOJ Bureau of Forensic Science is getting this analysis done in less than three weeks. It can take up to 60 days to get DNA analysis done in a typical lab, due to heavy casework loads, but RADS is designed to get the most egregious offenders off the street as soon as possible. The program is just about a year old now."

"We congratulate all of our members on receiving these very special awards from Attorney General Becerra," said CSLEA President Alan Barcelona. I would like to recognize the hard work and contributions of Analyst Ashlee Onwurah in the Dominique Jackson case (Yolo County Superior Court Case CR2021-0619) and conviction.

On December 15, 2019 Jackson attacked a woman in the laundry room of her apartment in West Sacramento, putting a knife to her throat. Jackson began taking off the victim's clothes and she screamed and fought him. Jackson knocked her to the ground and began stomping and kicking her. The victim suffered a broken nose and skull fractures, as well as two black eyes and bruising. Her blood was left all over the laundry room. Detectives put a still image of the suspect from CCTV out to the public, and tipsters called in to identify Jackson. A few days later Jackson was arrested and charged in the December 15, 2019 attack. Further investigation revealed that on March 5, 2019, Jackson followed a woman who was walking to work in West Sacramento. Jackson grabbed the woman and put a gun to her head. The victim was able to break free and ran. Jackson fled on foot. More investigation revealed that on May 30, 2019, a woman was walking home on the La Riveria bike path in Sacramento, and as she crossed the Salmon Falls foot bridge over Route 50 Jackson grabbed her and put her in a chokehold. He then forced her to orally copulate her while holding a knife. Jackson tried to have sex with the victim, and she scratched him, at which point Jackson picked her up and slammed her onto the ground. He then raped the victim, which continued until a bicyclist passed by and the victim called for help. The victim was able to escape and Jackson fled on foot.

All three cases were consolidated and tried in Yolo County. Well over one gigabyte of electronic evidence was seized in this case, including phone, cloud and social-media based data. A DA Investigator contacted VCISS for assistance in data analysis. Analyst Ashlee Onwurah was assigned this case, and she worked her way through the massive amount of data. Analyst Onwurah was able to identify a critical link between Jackson and the crime scene in West Sacramento, all from one text message, and DA Investigators were able to follow up on this information and present extensively on it in court. Analyst Onwurah also identified dozens of photos Jackson took of women in public without their knowledge, and a DA Investigator was able to present these photos as an aggravating factor to the jury.

On October 7, 2022 Jackson was convicted by a jury of nine counts and numerous enchancements, including Forcible Rape, Assault with intent to commit Rape while armed, Sexual Battery and infliction of Great Bodily Injury.

Jackson is currently pending sentencing and is facing 19 years to Life plus an additional 20 years.

Analyst Ashlee Onwurah tackled a challenging case involving a multi-county serial rapist, and was able to identify numerous items of evidence that our office used in the prosecution of Jackson. Our office appreciates her assistance and her dedication to the mission of seeking justice for our victims.

Mrs. Law:

I wanted to reach out to you to express my thanks and gratitude to the Violent Crime Investigative Support Section (VCISS) with the DoJ, and specifically Ashlee Onwurah.

I am a deputy district attorney in San Joaquin County and had the pleasure of working with Ashlee Onwurah earlier this year on a particularly complex case involving a series of back-and-forth shootings. These shootings resulted in three fatalities and two others that were seriously injured. Defendants were ultimately charged with 3 counts of murder, 3 counts of attempted murder, and conspiracy to commit murder.

Mrs. Onwurah's testimony was powerful evidence that was very persuasive with the jury. It is hard to describe her performance accurately, so as to give Mrs. Onwurah the credit she deserves, but she was the very definition of an "expert" witness. She was informed, intelligent, and charismatic. She simply had the aura or presence of a subject matter expert. She was also very adept at explaining complicated issues to the jury in layman's terms, which made it easy for them to follow along. I recall one moment during her testimony when I looked up at the jury and could see multiple jurors nodding their heads and listening to her every word. Several members of my own office were also present during Mrs. Onwurah's testimony and also stated that they found her to be an excellent witness, and that her analysis was strong evidence of defendants' guilt. In short, Mrs. Onwurah's professionalism and assistance was a key factor that helped convict both defendants of multiple counts of murder and attempted murder.

I consider the VCISS unit at DoJ to be a fantastic resource that helps me to be a better prosecutor, and I am grateful for their assistance. If you have any questions about my comments or interactions with Mrs. Onwurah, please do not hesitate to email or contact me.

Behind the Art: a Hornet profile of ASI president Artemio Pimentel

Sacramento State President Donald Gerth was conducting an important meeting in his boardroom when his secretary announced an unexpected visit from a young man and his father.

Gerth halted the meeting and invited them in. The young man was Art Pimentel, the President of Associated Students, Inc. He brought his father, a long-time migrant farm worker, to meet Gerth and visit the campus for the first time.

This was a big moment for his father- but for Art, it was even bigger.

"Art felt very proud to show the President his dad," says Professor Marcos Sanchez, the director of the College Assistance Migrant Program. "When you're a farm worker, and your son tells you he's the president of ASI, it's a concept you can't understand. What better way to help him understand than by bringing him to the campus and showing him around."

Elias Pimentel took time off work as a foreman of George Aoki Farms in Woodland that day, arriving at Sac State in his company?s tomato truck.

"I go to different farms and see if they need help," he says about his job.

Elias has worked for farms in Yolo County since he and his wife came to the U.S. in the 70s. Elias was 19 and his wife was 15 when they first met at a migrant workers post in Lodi. After marrying, they returned to their families in Michoacan, Mexico. They eventually immigrated to Woodland, where they raised their three sons and now raise their young daughter.

Pimentel, growing up as the youngest son in the family, would often help his father in the fields.

"I work with him as he drives all over the place," Pimentel says. "I get to drive the trucks, talk with the workers and ask them how the tomatoes are growing."

From an early age, Pimentel had a strong interest in the political arena. He hadn?t, however, held any positions in high school or early in his college yearsto distinguish himself as a leader.

Eric Guerra, ASI executive vice president, thought Pimentel was just an average student when he first met him. "As far as I knew, he was just a punk kid coming out of high school," he says.

Sanchez, however, saw something different in Pimentel when he first came to Sac State through CAMP. "The willingness to get involved in politics was already there. Some students, you have to encourage them, and even then they might not do anything. But he already had initiative," he says.

After receiving a couple of contacts from Sanchez, Pimentel started working at the Capitol as an intern for Assemblyman Tony Cardenas of the 39th District. His political career snowballed from there.

Pimentel, with Guerra, moved onto the campus political scene with their creation of the Political Awareness Club.

Pimentel then ran for and won the position of ASI Executive Vice President in 2000, and ASI President in 2001. Though he moved up the political ladder quickly, Pimentel was still learning the rules of the campus political arena. "He wasn't aware of the process of the university. He was a big visionary missing the steps in between," says Guerra.

"Now he's more realistic about what he can accomplish," says Sanchez. "Especially this year, since he's more responsible for managing ASI."

Since the start of the fall semester, ASI has addressed numerous controversial issues, including the Monday-Wednesday-Friday scheduling conflict. Yet Pimentel is happy with the way he and his administration have dealt with them. "ASI [in the past] wasn't in the headlines as much. Now we're taking care of student issues: housing, parking, campus life, making sure we have finances," he says.

Pimentel was recently thrown into the national limelight with his appearance on Nightline, commenting on Sacramento Bee Publisher Janis Heaphy's graduation speech last December. Despite the newfound fame and influence, Pimentel manages to stay grounded."I've seen past ASI Presidents tend to get bigheaded," says Angela Gomez, an ASI service representative. "But I don't see that in Art at all."

In addition to his duties with ASI, Pimentel maintains his job as manager of Denny's. "I do the freezer pool, take everything out one night before. I make a chef's prep of what they need for the next day," he says. Pimentel usually stays on duty to help the workers out. "Sometimes I go back there and cook."

After this semester, Pimentel plans to pursue a Master's degree in either Political Management at George Washington University or Public Policy at Sac State, and hopes to "maybe become mayor of Woodland, or even a teacher," he says. Pimentel hopes to continue being successful doing what he loves, working in politics and with students.

"I think he wanted his dad to experience that," says Sanchez.

But a six-figure estate gift was just the beginning of her philanthropy at Sacramento State.

Susan continues to support and benefit various areas of campus, including our planetarium, the Renaissance Society, Guardian Scholars, the College of Business, Sac State Cares, the Carlsen Center, and most recently, the Summer Undergraduate Research Experience Program. Susan established an endowment in memory of her late husband, Edward L. Wheeler, to support our chemistry students and provide them with the opportunity to conduct research with a faculty mentor and present their findings to peers and the community.

Susan is also in the process of establishing a named award for the College of Engineering & Computer Science, where she has served as an industry board member for several years. When ECS & NSM co-hosted a student pitch contest in conjunction with the Carlsen Center, Susan was quick to volunteer as a judge and brought the best out in the student presenters.

It's clear that "giving back" is more than just writing a check when it comes to Susan. This Hornet at Heart is eager to connect with students, mentor, and plug into her community. Her generosity and vision continue to inspire me and my peers in academic leadership. As a fellow "Hornet at Heart," there's no one else I'd rather see receive this incredible honor.

Duke Cooney is the embodiment of what Sacramento State stands for-leadership, service, and a deep commitment to community. As a first-generation college graduate, Duke used his education from Sacramento State as a launchpad to become a dedicated public servant and change maker in the Sacramento region.

Duke has dedicated his career to serving the Sacramento community through advocacy, public policy changes, and community empowerment. A proud graduate of Sacramento State University, where he founded Delta Lambda Phi - a Fraternity for Gay and progressive men, Duke went on to earn his law degree from McGeorge School of Law. While in law school, he worked full time as a Legislative Aid in the California Legislature, as a lobbyist advocating for the protection of California's natural resources, and with a non profit teaching community members to advocate for policy change that addresses childhood trauma.

From his early work in the California Legislature to his current role as a program manager, overseeing public affairs and government relations for Golden 1 Credit Union, Duke has remained deeply committed to uplifting under-served communities, advocating for civil rights, and advancing public policy. His experience includes being on the forefront of protecting the rights and liberties of Californians-most notably through his work with ACLU California Action, where he served as a legislative advocate focused on criminal justice reform, juvenile justice, and protecting the rights of the unhoused.

<u>Question 2</u>: What is your nominee's community involvement? Please list affiliations, volunteer work and activities beyond the normal scope of his or her work.

Beyond his professional accomplishments, he has continuously stepped up as a community leader on local boards, at schools, and non profit leadership.

Duke served as Vice Chair of Sacramento's Measure U Community Advisory Commission, where he advocated for transparency and equitable investment of city funds in under-served neighborhoods. He currently serves on the Measure M Community Oversight Committee for the Elk Grove Unified School District, ensuring responsible use of school bond funds to improve opportunities for students by upgrading educational and technical facilities.

Duke also serves on the School Site Council at his daughter's elementary school in Elk Grove Unified, where he works closely with school staff and parents to assess student needs and help allocate resources to address those needs.

His dedication to youth and families extends into the nonprofit space as well. Duke has held leadership roles on the boards of United and Guided, Inc. and Giving4Loss - organizations focused on mentoring youth, addressing trauma, and supporting community healing. Question 1: What makes your nominee an exceptional Sacramento State alumnus/na or friend of the University?

During a career spanning more than 30 years in California state government, Bob held a number of key positions. These included service as staff to the Joint Legislative Budget Committee, as a consultant to both the Assembly Ways and Means and the Senate Finance Committees, and as Chief Deputy Director of the California Department of Forestry.

The expertise gained and contributions made in these roles led to Bob's appointment in 1987 as the Chief Administrative Officer of the California State Assembly. In this capacity, Bob was responsible for directing the statewide administration of the Assembly's complex internal operations. The job was contentious and included responsibility for proposing a comprehensive plan to implement the 38 percent budget cut required by the passage of Proposition 140 in 1990. He successfully advocated for cuts that minimized impacts to both the public and Assembly staff. Bob earned great respect from the members for his honorable and honest service in this capacity until his retirement in 1995.

Bob was known as a consummate professional in his interactions with Assembly members, other elected officials, staff, the press, and the public. At the time of Bob's retirement, former Assembly Speaker and San Francisco Mayor Willie L. Brown, Jr., proclaimed him "among the most widely experienced and knowledgeable persons ever to serve as legislative staff." In the attached letter, Mr. Brown emphasizes that "Bob's career achievements are certainly exceptional...Few, if any, I have known could match his career resume."

<u>Question 2</u>: What is your nominee's community involvement? Please list affiliations, volunteer work and activities beyond the normal scope of his or her work.

Beyond his influential public service career, Bob was involved with the community in many meaningful ways. In Mr. Brown's endorsement, he emphasizes that Bob "was periodically tapped as a guest speaker for high school and college classes, not only because of his remarkable breadth of knowledge, but also because of his engaging personality and wonderful sense of humor." Having seen Bob's presentations from time to time, I know that he would illustrate or emphasize key points with references to history and to his own experiences. In her endorsement, Lynda Roper-Ayala describes Bob's volunteer involvement with the Sacramento Valley Conservancy, whose mission it is "to preserve the beauty, character and biodiversity of the Sacramento Valley landscape by protecting and stewarding natural and working lands, and scenic open spaces for the benefit of current and future generations."

Beyond his career success, Bob enjoyed many adventurous activities throughout his lifetime. These included parachute jumping as a young man, earning his private pilot's license, sailing, boat building and

horseback riding. In the mid-1960s, Bob and his first wife, Dorene "Dede," sailed their wooden sailboat, "Wind Wagon," from San Francisco to New Zealand and back by way of Tahiti and Hawaii. Bob often said one of the best moments of his life was watching Tahiti rise from the horizon at dawn after they had been at sea for 36 days while crossing the Pacific, using just a sextant for navigation.

Bob was proud of his accomplishments, including going on to build two sailboats, the 42-foot sloop, "Sundance," in the early 1970s, and - with second wife Deborah Domitrovich - the 48-foot cutter, "Amazing Grace," in the late 1980s. His stories from those experiences were captivating additions to his high school and collegiate presentations.

As Ms. Roper-Ayala describes in some detail, Bob - in his 70s - realized his lifelong dream of riding horses, after medical advancements allowed him to overcome his severe allergic reaction to them. The sheer joy on Bob's face was undeniable whenever he galloped his horse, Dillon, exclaiming an exuberant, "yeehaw!"

My friend – John Robert (Bob) Connelly – was a Renaissance man. His life and career were – and continue to be – the stuff of legend. Indeed, as you make your way through this posthumous nomination, you will be asking why Bob was not nominated during his lifetime. All I can say is that he should have been, and the fact he was not is my failing, not his. He was an outstanding individual whose lifetime embraced exploit, accomplishment, and success.

Bob was my colleague in the late 1970s, when he was a consultant to the state Senate Finance Committee, then chaired by Sacramento-area Senator Albert S. Rodda. He focused on the areas of resources, transportation, and the environment. In the late 1950s, Bob was a student of my father's – Dr. Baxter M. Geeting – when attending Sacramento State. Bob was my brother's employer for a brief time (summer 1960) when Bob managed the Hertz Rent-a-Car location at what was then Sacramento's principal commercial airport, and is now Sacramento Executive Airport.

A long-time resident of Sacramento, Bob passed away on December 14, 2023, at the age of 89. Bob was born on May 6, 1934, in the Bronx, New York. He and his older sister, Joan, were raised primarily by their mother, Gladys Mullen-Connelly, who moved the three of them to Sacramento from Philadelphia in 1945 via Greyhound bus. Bob attended and – in 1953 – graduated from C. K. McClatchy High School, where he was a staff writer for the student newspaper ("The Prospector") in his junior and senior years, as well as a featured actor in the senior play ("January Thaw") in the fall of 1952. Eventually, Bob attended and graduated from Sacramento State in 1960, majoring in History. Bob is survived by his daughter, Courtney Harrison, son-in-law, Jim Harrison, and many dear friends.

I will always remember Monday, May 14, 1984, when Bob called me to say a terrible toxic spill occurred on Highway 101 in downtown Santa Barbara, my Assembly district, and most of the city was being evacuated. Bob immediately said to me we need to be there and see what services we can organize and provide. Bob immediately flew with me, no overnight bag, clean clothing or anything. He reached out to his Sacramento contacts and additional resources were in route. Several days later, Bob put together a meeting in Santa Barbara with first responders. He listened and learned their needs. As a result of that meeting, Bob wrote legislation that I authored dealing with protocols amongst first responders clarifying and requiring folks to notify appropriate agencies of their actions. In addition, a second law Bob wrote that I also authored imposed strict liability on toxic waste haulers. Bob was personable, persuasive and smart. He is an individual who left a legacy that we all benefit from today.

I first met Bob due to my father, Dr. Baxter M. Geeting, who knew Bob as a former student. Bob asked about his ideas for summer (1960) employees at Hertz Rent-a-Car which he managed in Sacramento. Among others, Dad suggested me as I needed a summer job to help pay for my education at Stanford. I worked two weeks for Bob washing and cleaning cars between rentals. Bob appreciated my work ethic, and he asked if I wanted to become Night Manager at Hertz under his supervision. I was happy to do so for the remainder of the summer. Bob also recruited me to be the rental agent on Sundays which I gladly accepted. Bob was an excellent manager of people, and I thrived under his tutelage in all the positions. After summer was over I would occasionally see Bob in Sacramento when on school breaks, and of course, Bob eventually became a principal assistant to former Assembly Speaker Willie Brown.

Considerable time passed. I graduated from Stanford and moved into the production of television commercials in Chicago, IL. My producer role brought me back to CA for one automobile commercial, which I hoped to film on the Dumbarton Bridge (spanning part of San Francisco Bay) with some car-running shots taken near sunset. I approached the bridge administration and explained our plan, including what our crew would do to ensure safety. The answer to my request was a reflexive, resounding, and emphatic "no." After thinking for a few minutes, I had an "Ah Ha" moment and called Bob in Sacramento. Bob listened to my pleas and chuckled, then said, "Give me a few minutes." About five minutes later, a bridge administrator emerged from the office and assured me that our crew could proceed with the plan, given the safety measures outlined. The administrator even notified the CHP to help ensure there would be no issues with traffic control. The filming went off without a hitch…and all the commuters made it home on time!

I recall this story to illustrate not only that Bob was a wonderful friend, but also that he was someone who would take the time to listen to reason and to lend a helping hand. By the way, the crew spread the word, and I became something of a legend in the advertising agency as a person with connections. Thanks, Bob!

John Robert "Bob" Connelly Nomination for Lifetime Achievement Award

I am writing to lend support for the posthumous nomination of John Robert "Bob" Connelly for the Sacramento State University Alumni Association's Lifetime Achievement Award. My association with Bob spanned over 40 years, consisting of two separate and completely distinct chapters.

I met Bob when I was a young, inexperienced, and incredibly insecure legislative staffer. Bob was then serving as the state Assembly's Chief Administrative Officer, with responsibility for 80 elected officials, about 180 Capitol and district offices, and over 1,500 staff. Bob had a reputation for being an exacting taskmaster, who demanded hard work and expected excellence. This was true. But despite the pressures of his job, Bob was always approachable, and provided the advice and resources necessary to build alliances and solve problems.

Bob taught me that if you knew your subject matter better than anyone else in the room, you didn't need to fear public speaking. Under his guidance and supervision, I learned skills and gained confidence I never imagined. Thanks to the foundation Bob helped build, I enjoyed a 35-year career with the Assembly before retiring as the Deputy Administrative Officer. He set a standard for me – and so many other staffers – that brought out the best in each of us.

The second stage of my relationship with Bob began years after he retired. As a lifelong asthmatic, Bob was never able to pursue his dream of horseback riding. At age 70 – thanks to a new medication – that changed. I invited him to ride my horse and, within minutes, he was smitten. In his typical, uber-enthusiastic fashion, Bob took lessons, leased a horse, and then bought one of his own. Shortly thereafter, we learned about the Sacramento Valley Conservancy's equestrian program. The Conservancy's mission is to help preserve open space for the benefit of current and future generations. This mission spoke to us.

Bob and I became volunteer docents, leading guest riders at Deer Creek Hills, the Conservancy's 4,500-acre working cattle ranch in eastern Sacramento County. Bob completely embraced the role. The property's rich history melded perfectly with his knowledge about early settlers in the area. As we learned about the indigenous people who occupied the land, Bob quickly consumed books about their history.

Bob entertained and educated many guest riders over the years he served as a docent. He could easily talk about the settlers buried in the local cemetery, hydraulic mining in the 1800s, geologic formations, and the processes used by indigenous people to render acorns using grinding stones

still found on the property. The depth of his knowledge about these matters – and so many others – was remarkable. Visitors who arrived just expecting a nice ride, left with a greater appreciation for the property, its history, and importance of the Conservancy's work.

In retirement, Bob continued to thrive and contribute in other ways. In his 70s, he returned to CSUS to earn his Master's degree in history. He took this knowledge and love of history to various senior living facilities, where he volunteered to offer lectures to residents.

Bob participated in Renaissance Society courses at CSUS when he was in his 80s. His zest for living, learning, and giving back never diminished. Despite his many achievements, contributions, and brilliant mind, Bob was never boastful, preferring to speak with people about their experiences, struggles, and inspirations.

As fellow CSUS alumni, he and I often reflected on how fortunate we were to have benefited from this affordable institute of higher learning that equipped us to be successful, curious, contributing members of society. He expressed his appreciation for the ability to expand and share his knowledge well after retirement, thanks to CSUS programs. Bob's accomplishments and the positive influence on the many lives he touched make him an excellent candidate for this prestigious recognition.

So when San Francisco Democrat Willie Brown became Assembly speaker — the most powerful post in the state Legislature — he attempted to surround himself with the same staff that served him well when he chaired the Ways and Means Committee in the early 1970s.

For eight months, he worked on oceanographic research at the University of Hawaii before returning to Sacramento to work for the Legislature.

"'It looks like you have cancer,' my doctor said, and I knew it was serious when she added, 'You have an appointment for later this afternoon.'" This is a day Eva Jimenez will never forget – April 14, 2017, the day she learned she had breast cancer.

When Eva's husband Kris Koeberer heard the news, he said, "It felt like the air got sucked out of the room. I couldn't really process it."

Eva acknowledging that sensation added, "I think the hardest part for me was having to hit pause. I wasn't able to attend my daughter's high school graduation. There were days when I couldn't get out of bed or could only make it to the mailbox. Cancer is a difficult enough journey as it is without adding the complication of having to travel."

Kris drove Eva to Stanford regularly for her care due to the urgency of the situation and the availability of oncologists, but she was being treated in Stanford, not Redding. "My daughters wanted to be there. My parents wanted to be there," Eva said. "It was tough."

When asked about the new Regional Cancer Center, Eva's face lit up. "It is going to do amazing things for our community. The amenities of the new Center will help in recruiting oncologists who have the background in treating different variants of cancer."

"For me," Eva shared, "it is about changing lives and giving hope. That is why I am supporting the Regional Cancer Center."

Magical Bridge Morgan Hill

Ron and Shirlee Locicero are the Co-Founders of the Magical Bridge Inclusive Playground in Morgan Hill. Through partnerships with the County of Santa Clara and multiple community organizations, Magical Bridge Morgan Hill welcomes people of all ages and abilities. It is the first inclusive playground in the area between San Jose and Salinas, which is a point of pride for the South County Community.

Most playgrounds today are meant to be accessible for all children, but for children with special needs resulting from physical and emotional disabilities, their designs and features often do not provide meaningful play opportunities for all children. Consequently, special needs children most often sit by the wayside and watch their siblings and others play without them. By contrast, an "inclusive playground that is universally accessible" will allow children of all abilities to climb, to swing and spin, and to play side by side with their siblings and friends. Our community is growing and in need of creative and engaging places where families can play together, learn from each other, and grow in community together. What better way to grow in community, than through the gift of play.

Magical Bridge Park is intentionally designed to be socially inclusive, providing a safe and accessible outdoor play space for all, including the 1-in-4 of us living with physical and cognitive disabilities, autism, visual and hearing impairments, as well as for the medically fragile and our aging population.

Ron has utilized his training and experience from Sacramento State in networking and fundraising to enormous success! Ron and his wife Shirlee personally brought in over \$100,000 in donations to the Magical Bridge Park in Morgan Hill. Rona and his Team helped bring in over \$6 Million dollars to build the park over a seven year period. Ron also works on writing additional grants which are going to be used for enhancements to the park including additional shade and adding a teeter totter, carousel, balance beam and a zip line. Over the past forty-five years he has demonstrated that he is a proud Sac State alumnus and Sacramentan not only in spirit but also through his community involvement and support of the university.

Over the years, I've been fortunate to have interacted with Sharif (as most people call him) and have seen the many ways he has engaged with the campus and the larger Sacramento communities. In my view he has had a tremendous impact on the campus and its students, as well as the families and people of the greater Sacramento region. He has been selfless in donating his time, effort and resources in service to Sac State and Sacramento. In my view, Mahmud Sharif exemplifies what it means to be a recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award. But what motivated me to nominate him is more than just his record of service, but his indefatigable spirit, faith and goodwill toward everyone. No matter the obstacles, or how busy, he is always gracious and willing to lend a hand to whoever is in need. He has maintained a positive outlook in everything he does and as a result, people respond positively to his leadership and infectious personality.

In many ways Sharif was not the typical Sac State student. A native of Palestine, he came to Sacramento in 1979 to attend Sac State to study engineering. As an international student however, faced with the need for resources, he and his brother, who was also a Sac State student, opened a jewelry store in 1980 on Howe Avenue. This was in keeping with a family tradition of jewelers that began several decades earlier in his native country. While engaged in the daunting process of starting a business, he continued to work his way through school and graduated in 1983 with a BSc in Mechanical Engineering. While at Sac State, he was also involved with the Art Department and earned a minor in addition to his degree in Engineering. Starting a business and earning a college degree at the same time is no mean feat. Yet Mahmud accomplished both and achieved his goals. In fact, his interest in art and engineering are reflected in his work as a jeweler.

After obtaining his degree, he decided to continue with the business. Since the first Sharif Jewelers had done well, he was invested in building it further. It was during those early days that he was everywhere in the community, going to swap meets, working with people and becoming a fixture in the Sacramento business community. Fast forward to today and his success is evident. The first store he opened is now part of the Sharif Plaza at the same location. In addition, there are five other Sharif Jewelers in the great Sacramento region. And, in keeping

For example, after 9/11 he was instrumental in establishing the Interfaith Council. That year, over 300 people participated, including the Sheriff of Sacramento County and the Mayor of Elk Grove. It has continued and last year, the event was held at Sac State. This year it was held at UC Davis; the first time both universities participated together. Clearly, over the years, the Interfaith Council has played an important role in uniting the peoples and faiths of the region.

Sharif's vision, commitment and leadership are also reflected in the establishment of the SALAM (Islamic) Center of Sacramento. The Center was established as a place where people can come together as a community and celebrate while observing their traditions and religious beliefs. It is an important venue in Sacramento and has served the community well. It took years of planning and working together with other community members to make it a reality. Today it is an integral part of Sacramento and is recognized as a valuable resource as well as pride. As part of the Center, Sharif also established the Sharif Community Library where those who are interested can utilize the facility to explore and study at a higher level. In addition, classes are held for children and there are lectures and events for adults. More important however, is that the SALAM Center provides a place for faith and worship for the Muslim community in Sacramento.

Very much like his role in the community, Sharif's involvement with the university spans decades. While he has fond memories of his time as a student, he did not stop his affiliation with the campus once he graduated. He has been a fixture on campus and at Sac State events for years. He has been, and is currently, a member of the President's Circle and often is asked

for his advice. For example, he recently assisted Dr. Wood in further developing the international center on campus so that more international students can enroll at Sac State. In fact, this year he committed to support one international student to attend Sac State full time, which includes all expenses. Sharif attends Alumni events and supports the university in innumerable ways. In fact, he was featured on the Sac State website as a "Made at Sac State" profile. He is very proud of the fact that all five of his children are also alumni of Sacramento State. There is no doubt that he is a proud Hornet and doesn't hesitate to proclaim his great debt and affection he has for Sacramento State.
