

JUMPSTART

In fall 2021 we welcomed the Jumpstart program back to Sacramento State! After a ten-year hiatus, we are very excited to have this program back! Jumpstart matches university students with preschool children in under-served neighborhoods. Rachelle Davis came on board as our Jumpstart Site Manager; Dana Kivel, professor of parks, recreation and tourism administration, expertly served as principal investigator for the grant; and Kevin Ferreira Van Leer, assistant professor of child and adolescent development, was the service learning faculty, proving community connections as well as early childhood expertise.

Jumpstart is a national early education organization that recruits and trains college students and community volunteers to work with preschool children in low-income areas. Through a proven curriculum, these children develop the language, literacy, and social emotional skills they need to be ready for school.

The Community Engagement Center initiated 18 Jumpstart Corps Members. Corps Members are the heart of Jumpstart and execute the program's mission to create equitable learning outcomes. Corps Members served on teams with 5-7 peers and worked directly with a local Jumpstart staff member on training, session planning, service opportunities, and more. Importantly, they transformed the lives of 121 preschool children across 6 SETA Head Start early childhood education sites in the Sacramento region!

FIRST ANNUAL COMMUNITY BUS TOUR

On May 25th and 26th, a dream came true when 30 Sac State faculty, staff and administrators participated in the first annual Hornet Community Bus Tour (HCBT)! Campus participants connected and/or reconnected with each other and with more than 50 community partners. The "listening" tour allowed participants to learn about various non-profit, government, and community-based organizations that address education, affordable housing, unhoused populations, climate change, community development, school and community-based health programs, state and local government, food insecurity, workforce development, and urban agriculture. We met with Sacramento Mayor Darrell Steinberg and members of his staff who described some of the City's challenges, goals, plans and needs; and we met with the Mexican Consul-General Lilliana Ferrer and her staff who introduced us to the cultural, political and legal services provided through the Mexican Consulate.

The overarching goal for the bus tour is to introduce Sac State folks to the communities in which they live, work, and play and to motivate them to cultivate connections that will result in a variety of opportunities for students, mutually reciprocal research and project-based collaborations with community partners, and opportunities to volunteer with various organizations. This goal is aligned with Sac State's commitment to being an Anchor University where, individually and collectively, we are working to intentionally and strategically connect to and with individuals and agencies that represent our diverse community. This goal is also linked to the University's commitment to equity, inclusion, and anti-racism as we prioritize some of Sacramento's most under-resourced/high-promise communities to increase opportunities for all.

The HCBT itinerary was developed through a committee that included current and retired faculty and staff. Robin Datel, professor emeritus of geography, curated the experience during the tour by providing detailed historic, geographic and economic analyses as travelers wended their way through many parts of Sacramento. The tour was made possible through financial support from the Anchor University Advisory Council and the Community Engagement Center.

WRITING PARTNERS

The Writing Partners Program at Sac State pairs college students with elementary students in a collaborative letter exchange. Writing Partners incorporates academic and social learning goals, and supports Sac State and K-12 students as they learn that writing has the power to help them better understand themselves, their relationships to others, and the world. Sac State faculty have integrated Writing Partners into various departments across campus, including nursing, teacher education, EOP, first-year seminars, English, and engineering courses. The program culminates with the elementary students visiting Sac State to experience college life.

During the 2021-2022 academic year, the Writing Partners program coordinated both an in-person and a virtual format. Toward the end of the semester, the matched writing partners were able to meet one another either in a group Zoom event or on campus. In collaboration with Sac State Campus Tours Office, tour guides created and facilitated a customized, virtual campus tour for the elementary school students.

Writing Partners enhances creative and critical thinking skills and fosters a sense of authority in students as writers and as members of the campus community. The letter exchange also serves to solidify the university students' identify as a college student, as they share their college experiences with the K-12 students. For many 4th, 5th and 6th grade students, this is their first trip to a college campus and they enthusiastically express their excitement about being a college student one day.

In 2021-2022, ten faculty with 17 class sections were paired with 18 elementary school teachers. A total of 481 Sac State students exchanged letters with 493 elementary students from 17 schools in six school districts around the Sacramento area!

SACRAMENTO STATE DAY OF SERVICE

Day of Service

The Community Engagement Center kicked off
Sacramento State's first annual Day of Service. The
Student Volunteer Leaders and CEC Ambassadors
planned and coordinated the Day of Service events that
took place on March 12, 2022. Sac State Day of Service
is aligned with our campus identify as an Anchor
University. The University does not only reside within
our community but is also an integral partner with our
community for the betterment of all. Through service
projects such as these, Sac State students learn, grow,
and develop personally, and the work they do in turn
strengthens and enriches the region.

On Day of Service 2022, students and others participated in one of four volunteer opportunities developed through partnership with the following organizations.

SHRINERS HOSPITALS: Students completed 196 cards that were delivered to medical professionals at Shriners Hospitals for Children.

SOIL BORN FARMS: 59 faculty, staff, students, alumni and other participants helped glean fruits from neighborhood trees, donating 236 hours to Soil Born Farms.

ARBOR DAY: 88 participants planted 60 trees on the Sac State Campus and donated 308 hours of service. This project was a huge collaborative event that included Cal Fire, Circle4 AMPlifying the Urban Forests, CA Climate Investments, CA Urban Forests Council, Invest From the Ground Up, Sac State Residence Hall Association, Taylor Quality Guitars, The Britton Fund, West Coast Arborists, and Western Chapter International Society of Arboriculture.

BOYS AND GIRLS CLUB OF GREATER SACRAMENTO: 38 participants donated 152 hours of service to the building and grounds in preparation for in-person programs.











ALTERNATIVE SPRING BREAK

During Alternative Spring Break 2022, the Community Engagement Center and Associated Students, Inc. collaborated with two community partners to create a week of volunteer activities, both on and off campus, for the student population. This year, the central theme of Alternative Break was environmental justice and sustainability.

Several Del Paso Heights neighborhood projects were coordinated with Sierra Service Project and included rebuilding a fence for a family, planting and landscaping community gardens with Del Paso Heights Growers' Alliance, and building a play porch for young children between tiny transitional homes at Safe Harbor Tiny Home Village.

Deconstruction of the Solar Nest house on campus at the Arboretum, spearheaded by Emily Potts, assistant professor of interior architecture, allowed students to learn about the history of the Solar Nest home and techniques to safely take apart and salvage raw materials that were then donated to Habitat for Humanity. Project leads included PJ Carlino, assistant professor of design, and Gareth Figgess, associate professor of construction management.

Throughout the week of Alternative Spring Break, the student volunteers were led by the Community Engagement Center's Student Volunteer Leaders, Marissa Bustamante and Jermel Taylor, and Student Volunteer Ambassador, Anita Lor.





2022 COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT STUDENT FELLOWS


CRISJ COMMUNITY EMPOWERMENT FAIRE

Chong Un Choe-Smith will be assuming her new role as Associate Professor of Philosophy in August 2022. She earned her J.D. at UC Davis School of Law and her Ph.D. in philosophy at Georgetown University. Dr. Choe-Smith previously served as a Senior Appellate Court Attorney with the California Court of Appeal. She teaches applied ethics, political philosophy, and the philosophy of law. Her research interests are broad and often concern human rights, animal ethics, and global justice. She currently serves as affiliated faculty with the Center for Practical and Professional Ethics and as a new faculty associate with the Community Engagement Center.

Dr. Choe-Smith's engaged ethics approach to teaching involves developing and teaching courses in moral, social, political, and legal philosophy, with an emphasis on social justice and experiential learning. She currently teaches a service-learning course in ethics, covering issues such as the philosophy of race, gender ethics, and immigration, and serves as the Philosophy Department's internship coordinator. Her current research also focuses on social or global justice, specifically migration ethics, and experiential learning with recent publications "Should Undocumented Immigrants Have Access to Public Benefits" in Social Philosophy and "Academic Internships in Philosophy" in Teaching Philosophy.

Erin Rose Ellison, a community psychologist with over 15 years in the field, is an assistant professor of psychology, a member of the Anchor University Advisory Council, and a new Faculty Associate for Community Engaged Research at the CEC. Dr. Ellison received her Ph.D. in social psychology, with an emphasis in feminist studies, at UC Santa Cruz, and employs participatory action research (PAR), ethnography and social network analysis to study how relationships facilitate or constrain collective empowerment for groups lacking social power and an equitable share of resources. She often works in collaboration with youth in school-based programs or adult community organizers.

Dr. Ellison has been a boat cleaner, bartender, AmeriCorps member (rehabbing homes, working in a food bank, and delivering meals on wheels), a youth worker, non-profit worker, union and community organizer, urban farmer, evaluation researcher, and now a professor! When not working long days to make sure our awesome Sacramento State students have an excellent experience in the classroom and in community-based research, Dr. Ellison loves riding bikes, walking the cutest dogs ever (Rocky and Daphne), cooking, gardening, sailing, and creating!



COMMUNITY PARTNER SURVEY RESULTS

In February 2022, the Community Engagement Center surveyed all community partners with existing Academic Internship/Service Learning (IN/SL) agreements. This survey assessed the needs and opportunities for students during the Spring 2022, Summer 2022, and Fall 2022 terms. Looking towards the fall, over 30 of our community partners responded with ideas for student engagement in Fall 2022. Many partners, like the Boys and Girls Club of Greater Sacramento, described roles related to direct services (e.g., facilitating youth programming). Others, like Breakthrough Sacramento, noted capacity-building opportunities (e.g., conducting research on best practices for social and emotional learning). Desired majors spanned an array of programs across the Sacramento State campus and many partners noted they were open to exploring new ideas for collaboration. PROFESSIONAL LEARNING COMMUNITY

The Community Engagement Center offered a new Professional Learning Community (PLC) in the Fall 2021 and Spring 2022 semesters titled "Cultivating Community-Engaged Faculty, Staff, and Students: Seeding the Anchor University". This PLC introduced the many opportunities for faculty, staff, and students to be engaged in the community and simultaneously support Sacramento State's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and Anchor University initiatives. Participants heard presentations about creating academic internship programs, offering service learning and curricular community-engaged learning experiences, conducting community-engaged research, participating in community service, connecting with community partners, and more.

We were pleased to have a record number of 17 participants complete this PLC. Participants heard presentations from co-facilitators Ann Moylan, Rachel August, Kevin Ferreira van Leer, and Dana Kivel, and guest presenters Francine Redada and Erin Rose Ellison, and also joined in lively conversations and idea exchanges about community engagement. Each participant completed a detailed Three-year Community Engagement Action Plan which identified the community-related issues and community groups of most interest to them, key goals they plan to accomplish, strategies for reaching those goals, and outcomes anticipated as a result of reaching their goals. Participants presented their Action Plans and reflections on the PLC at the Center for Teaching and Learning Faculty and Professional Learning Communities Spring, 2022 Culminating Event.





THE NEW CURRICULAR COMMUNITY ENGAGED LEARNING COURSE DESIGNATION

- reciprocal partnerships,
- academically relevant community involvement, and
- a specific benefit to some shared material, cultural, or institutional interest of our broader community.


This course designation offers faculty a new avenue of participation in community-engaged learning that enhances student learning through impactful, hands-on interaction with our community partners. At the same time, because CCEL does not require all of the essential elements of service learning such as critical reflection assignments and integrated

assessment of civic learning goals, a CCEL opportunity can be more easily added to an existing course or designed into a new course.


One of the main motivations for creation of this new CCEL course designation is to capture all the meaningful and impactful ways our faculty and students partner with the community to advance student learning. Our faculty and students may be involved in various forms of community-engaged learning across the university and in our communities, but without the new course designation, those experiences were not being counted or celebrated.
