For Students Wanting Help with Academics

Want to increase your success in studying for a test or completing an assignment for a class—and grow in the skills and knowledge you will need in your future coursework to graduate and beyond?

Tutoring and academic support services are free to students, with the exception of just a few that are listed as courses (which may then require an enrollment fee). Take advantage of all of the help offered to you around the campus!

Peer Academic Resource Center (PARC)—

Provides a home base of academic support to students at all levels through a number of services that include Peer-Led Advising for College Experiences, Tutoring, Workshops, and Supplemental Instruction courses and review sessions, described below. Students may go online, call, or come by for further information, availability hours, and appointments for the tutoring, workshops, supplemental instruction courses and review sessions described below. Tutoring—

Offers tutoring (on a one-on-one basis or in workshops with small groups) to help students in challenging courses learn material, complete assignments, and prepare for exams.

Workshops—

Presents workshops on essential college skills, including time management, study skills, and APA/MLA formatting.

Supplemental Instruction (SI) Courses—

Helps students enrolled in difficult general education courses to become more successful in their coursework by taking an accompanying SI course that will help the student to better learn the material, complete assignments, and study for exams. SI courses are taken for one unit of credit, and course offerings are provided on the website. SI provides two exam review sessions and SI leaders, with office hours for students who want more one-on-one assistance. SI courses may be found in the campus class schedule for enrollment.

Supplemental Instruction (SI) Plus—

Provides free academic review and test preparation sessions connected to the Supplemental Instruction classes. These sessions are available for *all students* who may have conflicting schedules and missed the opportunity to register for the one-unit SI courses. Sessions are scheduled throughout the semester, mostly before midterm and quizzes in the professor's large lecture course—check on this information page for a [schedule for upcoming SI Plus sessions](#).

University Reading and Writing Center—

Provides one-on-one assistance with reading, writing, and research. Students can bring assignment prompts, research materials, readings, work completed so far, or anything else they think will help with the tutoring session. Tutoring sessions are 25 to 55 minutes in length, and options include in-person tutoring (scheduled appointment or drop-in), online tutoring via Zoom, or email feedback to the student. Appointments may be scheduled by coming into the Center or emailing a request for an appointment (with your name, student ID number, list of times you are available to meet with a tutor, and preference for in-person, on Zoom, or email feedback with 48 hour response).

Smarthinking—
