**Description of the course:** Detailed consideration of behavior disorders and maladaptive behavior: theories of causation, descriptions of the disorders, and strategies of various therapies.

**Prerequisites:** Students must have successfully completed Psychology 2 [OR Psychology 1 with Psychology 5 recommended].

- At times, short readings may be distributed in class. These will be considered required reading for the exams unless specifically designated as optional.
- It is **highly recommended** that you read the assigned material **before** attending lectures on a particular topic. This will enable you to learn the material more efficiently.

You may be asked to participate in class activities designed to encourage open conversations about course material.

# **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

Attendance and promptness: You are expected to be present and on time for all class meetings. Many students find that regular attendance at class enables them to learn assigned material more easily and therefore enhances their performance on exams. The required course readings will provide information on a range of topics, whereas the lectures and class discussions will focus on selected topics in more depth. It is your responsibility to obtain information about any announcements, class notes, and handouts from other **classmates** in the event of an absence.

# Exams (100 points each, best 3 of 4 counted, for 300 total available points):

- Number: Four non-cumulative exams will be offered. The top three grades will be used to calculate your final grade; therefore you are free to miss any \*one\* of the exams, although it is recommended that you take all four exams to facilitate both your learning and your ability to earn the highest grade you can. Do not schedule travel plans or commit to other obligations that may conflict with the exam schedule. Please do not request exceptions.
- Makeup policy: Makeup exams will not be offered. If you miss an exam for any reason, you will receive a score of zero.
- **Modifications:** Exams will be offered in class and on the scheduled final exam day. The instructor reserves the right to modify the exam procedures or schedule as needed.
- **Policy on lowest exam grade:** Your lowest exam score will be dropped. Thus, if you have missed an exam for any reason, you will need to drop that exam grade.
- **Coverage:** The four non-cumulative exams may integrate concepts from prior exams, but will not comprehensively test previous topics. Each exam will cover material from the assigned readings as well as additional material presented in course lectures (including videotapes) and class discussions.
- **Format:** Each exam will consist of multiple-choice questions (at the instructor's discretion, other objective formats may be utilized such as matching and/or true/false). You will be informed of the format of exams prior to the day they are given.
- Lateness policy: Students who are more than 20 minutes late to exams will not be admitted.
- **Materials needed for exams:** You will need to bring a bubble sheet (#4521) and an adequate supply of sharpened #2 pencils with you to each exam.

**Quizzes (8 points each, best 6 of 7 counted, for 48 total available points):** Seven open-book quizzes will be offered (2 per section of the course after the first section), of which each student's top six will be used in calculating final grades. These will be offered through SacCT, and will be available on pre-specified days at or toward the beginning of a new topic. The purpose of the quizzes will be to encourage timely reading of the material and therefore, to facilitate enhanced performance on the exams. Each quiz will consist of 4 multiple-choice questions worth 2 points each (8 points total). Quiz questions are typically more factual and less complex than exam questions.

**In-Class Assignments & Tasks (4 points each, 10 assignments; 32 points required and up to 8 points extra credit):** There will be 10 brief in-class assignments offered this semester; dates for these will **NOT** be announced in advance. The format of these assignments will vary, but may include response paragraphs, short answers, multiple choice quiz questions, or other formats; these will be related to lecture material. These may be carried out individually or in small groups, at the instructor's discretion. These will be a source of required (32) as well as potential extra-credit (8) points; points will not be available if you are not present in class at the time that the assignment is carried out. [Because 8 of these points are potential extra credit, you will not be unduly

penalized for one or two absences in the event of illness.] You will be expected to have paper and a pen with you in order to complete these assignments
