MILDRED AGNES DAWSON

Mildred Agnes Dawson, emeritus professor of education at CSUS, died in Fairfield, Iowa on December 15. 1988 at the age of 91.

Born in Sumner, Iowa, Dr. Dawson received a B.A. from Iowa State College in 1922, an M.A. from the University of Chicago in 1928, and an Ed.D, from New York University in 1936.

Prior to joining the CSUS faculty in 1954, Dr. Dawson served variously as an elementary school teacher, critic teacher, research assistant, department chairperson, book editor, and professor in Iowa, Pennsylvania, Wyoming, Georgia, Tennessee, New York, and North Carolina, She assumed professor emeritus status at CSUS in 1965.

Dr. Dawson is well known for her role in the International Reading Association (president) and as a proauthor. Her LANGUAGE FOR DAILY USE. GRADES 2-6. was adopted in 36 states, In addition she authored or co-authored 31 books for teachers and young children.

IDA E. MORRISON

Ida B. Morrison, emeritus professor of education, died in early March in Sacramento following a long period of ill health. After receiving her doctorate at Columbia University, she taught in the elementary school, including a notable period working in Indian schools in Nevada.

Joining the Sacramento State College faculty in 1950, Dr. Morrison influenced the teaching and lives of many hundreds of students before her retirement in 1970. Author of articles in professional journals and a textbook in kindergarten-primary education, she affected teaching methodology far beyond her local community. As a senior professor she served as mentor for faculty new to the campus. Dr. Morrison also served as a writer for WONDERTIME, a pioneering Sacramento television program for little children, from lific from 1960 to 1962.


ALASKA: CRUISE THE INSIDE PASSAGE

Dr. Patty Gibson, lecturer in Anthropology at CSUS, will lead a travel-study cruise this summer of Alaska's Inside Passage. Cruise aboard the 500 passenger vessel, **the 55 UNIVERSE**, **to view** Alaska from **the sea**, from its breathtaking scenery of rugged mountains and virgin forests to its gigantic glaciers and exotic wildlife.

This cruise is unique in that several university specialists are 'in residence' to offer talks and lectures on the unique features of Alaska, ranging from its geology and wildlife to the various native cultures. Additionally, the ship holds the largest library afloat in the world, allowing passengers to browse through the large collection.

Two departure dates are scheduled for June 30 and July 28, 1989. The 17-day tour begins with two nights in Vancouver before boarding the ship with stops in Victoria, Ketchikan, Glacier Bay, Valdez, and several other places. Many side excursions are possible in each of the ports. The cost of the 17-day is \$2070 per person based on inside double occupancy.

Dr. Gibson has led travel-study tours to Kenya for the past two years. She also led a research group to Nepal and has traveled extensively. As an anthropologist specializing in animal behavior, she hopes to provide additional insights in the Alaskan area.
