College Sport Options

- ❖ NCAA Division I, II, III
 - Division I offers athletic scholarships
 - There are two divisions for football
 - Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Div. I-A)
 - Football Championship Subdivision (formerly Div. I-AA)
 - Division II offers some athletic scholarships
 - Division III offers no athletic scholarships

NOTE: Athletic scholarships are a one year contract.

Quick Overview of NCAA

Division I

- Highest level of intercollegiate athletics
- Typically large student body size
- Athletic grants-in-aid available


Division II

- Small to medium sized schools, smaller athletic budgets
- Athletic grants-in-aid available

Division III

- Largest of the three divisions, typically small student bodies
- Athletic grants-in-aid <u>not available</u>, generally students participate for the love of the sport

NCAA Eligibility Center Registration






Freshmen and Sophomores Must:



- Start planning now by working hard to get the best grades possible.
- Access and print your high school's List of NCAA Courses at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> by clicking "Resources" at the top of the screen.
- Take classes that are on your high school's List of NCAA Courses. The NCAA Eligibility Center will only use approved courses to certify your initial eligibility.
- Register at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u> at the beginning of your sophomore year.
- If you fall behind, use summer school sessions <u>before</u> your senior year to catch up.



Juniors Must:



- Register to take the ACT, SAT or both and use the NCAA Eligibility Center code "9999" as a score recipient.
- Double check to make sure that you are taking courses that are approved on your high school's List of NCAA Courses.
- Request that your high school counselor send an official transcript to the NCAA Eligibility Center after completing your junior year. (The NCAA Eligibility Center does NOT accept faxed or emailed transcripts.)



Seniors Must:

Continue to take college-preparatory courses.

Check your List of NCAA Courses.

Take the ACT or SAT as many times as necessary.

Graduate on time (eight semesters).



Seniors Must:



- Visit the "My Planner" page after you register online to view your eligibility status and check for any missing information or documents
- Review your sports participation (amateurism) responses and request final amateurism certification beginning April 1 (for fall enrollees) or October 1 (for spring enrollees).
- After graduation, ask your high school counselor to send your final transcript with proof of graduation to the NCAA Eligibility Center.



Important Tips

- ✓ Make sure you write down your username and password information.
- ✓ If you attended multiple high schools, each transcript needs to be sent to the Eligibility Center.
- ✓ If you went to a college to make up work, you need to send those transcripts to your high school and have them post the grades on your high school transcript. You also need to have that college send a transcript directly to the Eligibility Center.
- ✓ If your guidance counselor asks for a transcript release form, you can find this in the "Forms" section on the "Resource" page of the new website.
- ✓ Credit Recovery The NCAA typically with not accept most forms of credit recovery.

What's the Certification Status?

Qualifiers – Eligible for athletic aid, practice and competition.

Non-qualifier – not eligible for athletic aid, practice and competition.

Note: A student with an education impacting disability must meet the same requirements as all other students, but may be provided certain accommodations to help meet those requirements. The accommodations provided differ between NCAA Division I and Division II schools.

ACADEMIC INITIAL-ELIGIBILIT REQUIREMENTS



Academic Requirements

- Graduate from high school.
- Complete NCAA-approved courses.
- Earn a minimum required core-course grade-point average (GPA).
- Earn a required SAT or ACT sum score.



Division I Core-Course Requirements

16 Core Courses

- 4 years English.
- 3 years math (Algebra I or higher).
- 2 years natural/physical science (1 year of lab if offered by high school).
- 1 year additional English, math or natural/physical science.
- 2 years social science.
- 4 years additional courses (from any area above, foreign language or comparative religion/philosophy).




What Is A Core Course?

- A course that qualifies for high school graduation in one or more of the following: English, mathematics, natural or physical science, social science, foreign language or comparative religion or philosophy;
- Is considered four-year college preparatory;
- Is taught at or above the high school's regular academic level;
- For mathematics courses, is at the level of Algebra I or higher; and
- Is taught by a qualified instructor as defined by the appropriate academic authority.



Early Academic Certification

Students who meet the following criteria after <u>six semesters</u> will be certified as qualifiers:



- 3 English;
- 2 math;
- 2 science;
- 2 additional core courses in English, math or science; and
- 5 additional core courses in any area.

For Division II: Minimum SAT (math and critical reading) of 1000 or minimum sum score of 85 on the ACT; and a core-course GPA of 3.000 or higher in a minimum of 12 core courses:

- 3 English;
- 2 math;
- 2 science; and
- 5 additional core courses in any area.

What are Nontraditional Courses?

- Courses taught through:
 - The Internet (online or virtual);
 - Distance learning;
 - Independent study;
 - Individualized instruction;
 - Correspondence;
 - Computer software programs; or
 - Other similar means.



Things to Consider <u>before</u> Taking Nontraditional Courses

- Must include ongoing access between the instructor and student.
- Must have a defined time period for completion (i.e., six weeks).
- Should be clearly identified as nontraditional courses on the high school transcript.
- Must be four-year college preparatory and need to be comparable in length, content and rigor to courses taught in a traditional classroom setting.



NCAA Division I Initial-Eligibility Academic Requirements (New)

There are new requirements for college-bound studentathletes enrolling full time at an NCAA Division I college or university on or after August 1, 2016.

High School

NCAA Division I



Summary of Changes

- Minimum core-course GPA of 2.300 required;
- Slight change in GPA/test-score index (sliding scale); and
- Ten core courses required before the beginning of senior year.

The following slides explain these changes in further detail.



NCAA Division I Initial-Eligibility Academic Requirements (New)

For college-bound student-athletes enrolling full time at an NCAA Division I college or university on or after August 1, 2016, there are three possible academic outcomes:

- Qualifier = competition, athletics aid (scholarship), and practice the first year.
- 2. <u>Academic Redshirt</u> = athletics aid the first year, practice in first regular academic term (semester or quarter).
- 3. <u>Nonqualifier</u> = no athletics aid, practice or competition the first year.



NCAA Division I Qualifier:

Requirements for Athletics Aid, Practice and Competition (New)

Students will need to meet the following requirements to receive athletics aid, practice and compete their first year:

- 16 core courses in the following areas:
 - 4 years English;
 - 3 years math at Algebra I level or higher;
 - 2 years natural or physical science (one lab if offered at any high school attended);
 - 1 year additional English, math or natural/physical science;
 - 2 years social science; and
 - 4 years additional from areas above or foreign language, philosophy or comparative religion.
- Minimum required GPA:
 - Minimum GPA of 2.300 in those 16 core courses.



NCAA Division I Qualifier:

Requirements for Athletics Aid, Practice and Competition (New)

- Core-course progression.
 - Must complete 10 core courses before seventh semester of high school (e.g., senior year).
 - Of the 10 core courses completed, seven must be in the area of English, math, or science.
 - These 10 core courses become "locked in" for the purpose of GPA calculation.
 - A repeat of any of the "locked in" courses will not be used if taken after the seventh semester begins.



Division II Core-Course Requirements

16 Core Courses

- 3 years English.
- 2 years math (Algebra I or higher).
- 2 years natural/physical science (1 year of lab if offered by high school).
- 3 years additional English, math or natural/physical science.
- 2 years social science.
- 4 years additional courses (from any area above, foreign language or comparative religion/philosophy).



Test Score Requirements

Division II

- Earn a 2.000 GPA or better in your core courses.
- Earn a combined SAT score of 820 or an ACT sum score of 68.



Division III Core-Course Requirements

- Unlike Divisions I and II, there is no uniform set of eligibility requirements for Division III schools.
- Eligibility for admission, financial aid, practice and competition is determined by the college or university.
- The NCAA Eligibility Center does not perform certifications for Division III college-bound student-athletes.



Courses Prior to the 9th Grade

- ✓ Only 8th grade counts.
- Many students now take Algebra I and Foreign Language prior to the ninth grade.
- ✓ For the NCAA Eligibility Center to give this credit as a "core course", the class, grade and credits all have to show up on the high school transcript.

AMATEURISM CERTIFICATION

The amateurism certification process will certify all prospects (high school, two-year, four year, domestic and foreign) wishing to enter Division I or II:

Amateurism questions will be asked when the PSA completes the sport participation section during the registration process.

- ✓ You can update your information as often as needed.
- ✓ Students will be required to log into their accounts on or after April 1st of their senior year to request a final amateurism certification.
