Thanksgiving Food Baskets

The Pop Up Food Pantry provides healthier eating options by distributing fresh produce at no cost to Sac State students in need.

- 2018: 75 food baskets (50 for students and 25 for non-profit organization)
- 2019: 85 food baskets (60 for students and 25 for non-profit organization)
- 2020: 230 food baskets
- Community members of 7 Non-Profits in the Greater Sacramento area each received 10 Thanksgiving Food Baskets
- Donations are were collected through 2 planned drive-thru donation events and monetarily through a fundraiser in collaboration with Sac State. These drive thru events collected enough food to fill over 60 baskets
- With the help of our community, the Thanksgiving Food Baskets Program raised \$10,485 to support students in need locally and across the nation

28% of respondents said 6-10 days.

12% of respondents said 11-20 days.

4% of respondents said 21-30 days.

In the last 30 days, how many days did you skip meals because there wasn't enough money for food?

24% of respondents said 0 days.

47% of respondents said 1-5 days.

23% of respondents said 6-10 days.

4% of respondents said 11-20 days.

1% of respondents said 21-30 days.

In the last 30 days, were you very hungry and ate less than you needed to or didn't eat at all because you didn't have enough money for food?

66% if respondents said YES.

How long have you been dealing with food insecurity?

57% of respondents said 1-3 months.

25% of respondents said 3-6 months.

7% of respondents said 6 months – 1 year.

12% or respondents said over 12 months.

Note: The USDA defines food insecurity as having "limited or uncertain access to nutritious and safe foods because of a lack of money and other resources."
