High School Equivalency Program (HEP)

What We Do

The High School Equivalency Program (HEP) is a federally funded program that helps migrant and seasonal farmworkers who are 18 years of age or older and not currently enrolled in school to obtain the equivalent of a high school diploma (HSE) and gain employment, go to an institution of higher education, the military, other postsecondary education, or vocational training.

Program Goals

- Recruit and enroll 100% of the 70 eligible adults and out-of-school youth
 - AY 2017-2018: 70 students
 - AY 2018-2019: 74 students
 - AY 2019-2020: 70 students
 - AY 2020-2021: 70 students
- 75% of the eligible participants will receive a high school equivalency diploma (HSED) within the academic year
 - AY 2017-2018: 76% of students (53 out of 70)
 - AY 2018-2019: 100% of students (74 out of 74)
 - AY 2019-2020: 81% of students (57 out of 70)
 - AY 2020-2021: 57% of students (40 out of 70)
- 80% of HEP participants will enter postsecondary education or training programs, upgraded employment, or the military
 - AY 2017-2018: 92% of students (49 out of 53)
 - AY 2018-2019: 95% of students (70 out of 74)
 - AY 2019-2020: 86% of students (49 out of 57)
 - AY 2020-2021: 95% of students (38 out of 40)

COVID Response

The 2020-2021 academic year was a very challenging year due to the pandemic. For that reason, the HEP program did the following:

- On March 2020, we surveyed HEP students on computer and internet usage to help design the best approach to proceed with the instruction and delivery.
 - a. Do you have a computer? 43/45 (95%) do not own a computer
 - b. Do you know how to use a computer? 43/45 (95%) do not know how to use a computer
 - c. Do you have internet? 43/45 (95%) do not have internet connection

Based on the responses from the survey, HEP designed a hybrid model to deliver instructions. Over 95% of the students attended classes using their cell phones and used printed materials (books and handouts were prepared by the HEP staff and shipped to students).

- California Wellness Foundation (CWF) provided a health workshop about COVID-19: symptoms and prevention. Workshop was provided in Spanish and focused on the COVID-19 in the migrant farm working community.
- La Familia (Housing for Harvest), in partnership with Sacramento County, offered a workshop to support farmworkers who had COVID-19 or were around someone who had COVID-19. Migrant workers were eligible to receive quarantine support and stay at a hotel.
- El Concilio, a non-profit organization, offered a workshop to identify the stressors during the time of COVID-19 and provided activities and coping mechanisms for the family to do at home.
