

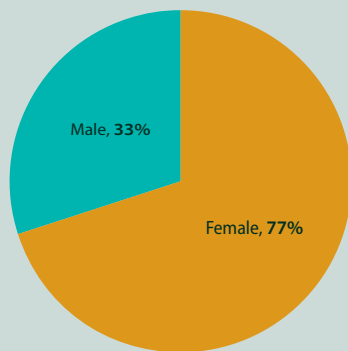
HIGH SCHOOL EQUIVALENCY PROGRAM (HEP)

What We Do

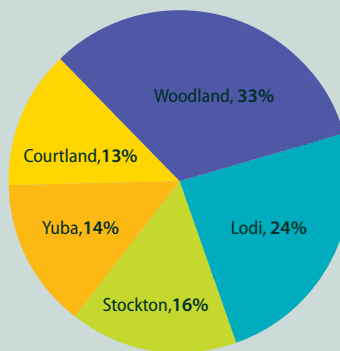
The High School Equivalency Program (HEP) is a federally funded program that helps migrant and seasonal farmworkers who are 17 years of age or older and not currently enrolled in school to obtain the equivalent of a high school diploma (HSE) and gain employment, go to an institution of higher education, the military, other postsecondary education or vocational training.

Demographics

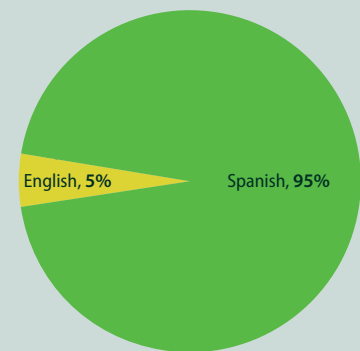
N=70 Age Range= 18-55 years old

Gender



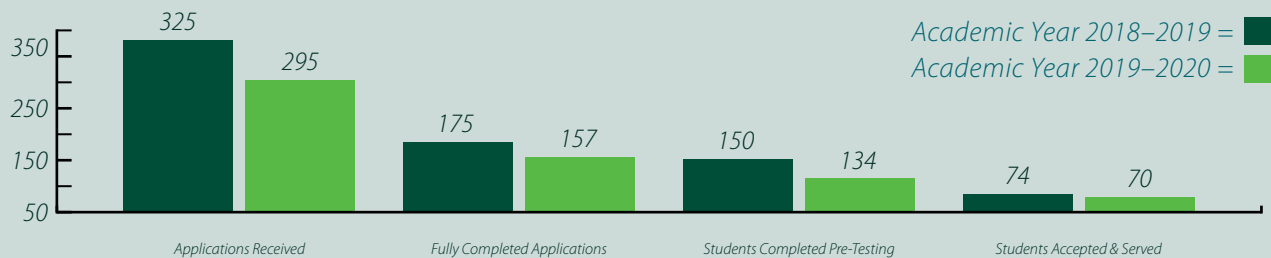

Outreach Efforts

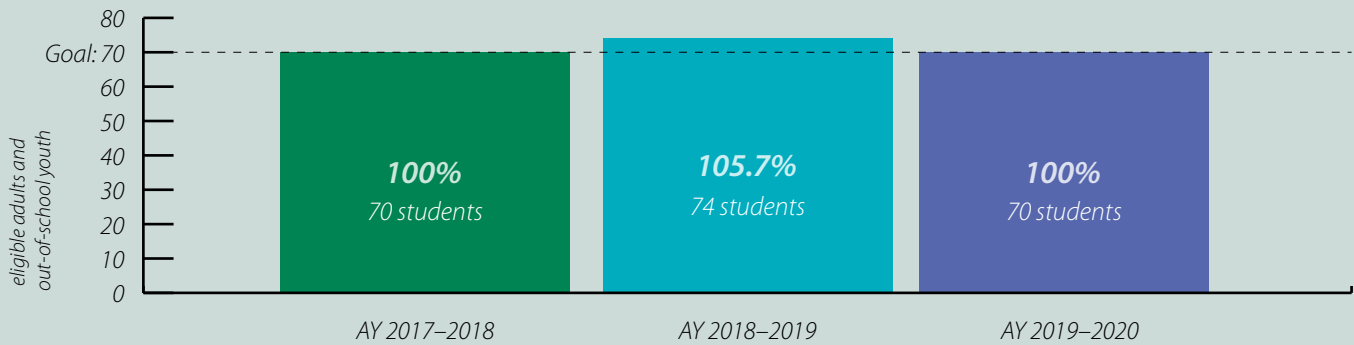

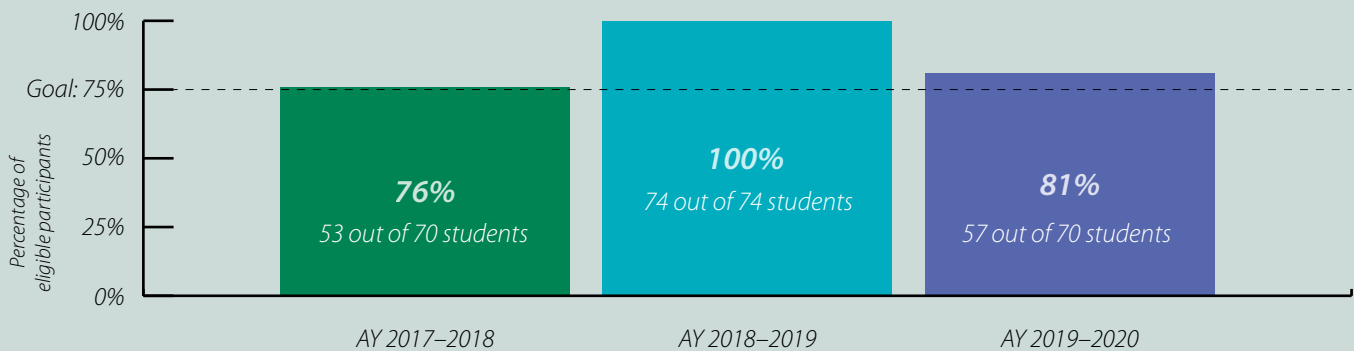
Program Goals



Recruit and enroll 100% of the 70 eligible adults and out-of-school-youth



Have 75% of the eligible participants receive a high school equivalency diploma (HSED) within the academic year



Have 80% of the HEP participants enter postsecondary education or training programs, upgraded employment, or the military
